#### PREFACE

Trivenidevi Bhalotia College, situated at Raniganj in Burdwan district of West Bengal and registered under 2(f) and 12B of the UGC Act, is submitting the Self Study Report for Assessment and Accreditation in the first cycle. The college commenced its journey from 1957 and was affiliated to Calcutta University at the outset. It, however, became affiliated to the University of Burdwan from 1st July, 1960, after creation of the university in 1959. At present the college is in a state of transition as regards its status of affiliation. The college has been affiliated to the Kazi Nazrul University, Asansol from 24<sup>th</sup> June, 2015. It may be pertinent here to write a few words of introduction about the college.

Trivenidevi Bhalotia College (T.D.B. College), the second governmentsponsored institution of higher education to be set up in Asansol Sub-Division of Burdwan District of West Bengal, was established in 1957. Individuals from different strata of society - educationists, administrators, public representatives, social workers and businessmen were of the strong opinion that such an institution was essential to fulfill the dreams of aspirants of higher education in Raniganj and the coalfield and rural areas surrounding it, and their collective endeavour under the leadership of Sri Banawarilal Bhalotia, an eminent social worker and businessman, resulted in the setting up of this college. In July 1956, Srimati Trivenidevi Bhalotia, wife of Sri Banawarilal Bhalotia, after whom the college is named, donated a sum of Rupees One Lakh and Sri M.L. Bhartia, Sri P.L. Ganeriwala, Sri K.N.Shaw and Sri B.N. Shaw together donated 9.354 acres of land for construction of the college building together with staff quarters for teachers (which was financed by various donors). Construction of the aforementioned buildings began in 1958.

In its nascent stage, the college was permitted to teach the following subjects:-

**I.A:** English, Bengali, Elective Bengali, Hindi, Sanskrit, History, Civics, Logic, Mathematics, Commercial Geography, Commercial Mathematics and Book keeping.

**I.Sc:** English, Bengali, Hindi, Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics and Biology.

**B.A. (Pass):** English, Bengali, Elective Bengali, Hindi, Sanskrit, History, Economics and Mathematics.

The college was permitted to admit 300 students initially. The founder- Principal of the college, Dr. Arya Kumar Bandyopadhyay joined the college in July, 1957, and soon teachers and non- teaching staff were recruited. Initially, the college was housed in Raniganj High School where



classes were held in the morning. The college library and laboratories were set up here.

The two storied college building was completed in 1960 and was inaugurated by the then Chief Minister of West Bengal, Dr. Bidhan Chandra Roy. The college was shifted to its own building from the session 1960 - 61. Teachers also shifted to their newly built staff quarters. A hostel for Male students (Boys' Hostel) was constructed adjacent to the college building, 50% of the funds for which were given by UGC. B.Sc. classes in the Day section and B.Com classes in the Evening were started giving the institution the status of a fully fledged Degree College.

The main aim of T.D.B. College has always been to impart quality education to provide productive human capital. With this objective, the expansion and development of the college continued in terms of both academics and infrastructure, notably under the two far-sighted Principals of the college- Sri C.R. Mazumder and Sri Harasanakar Bhattacharya. Different subjects and courses were gradually introduced as follows:-

In 1976, at the initiative of the Professor-in charge Dr. A.C Roy, the teachers of the college gladly volunteered their services to meet the needs of students of the new academic pattern of +2 courses – the only institution in the locality to come forward without any compulsion. In addition to curricular activities, students have been participating in co-curricular activities like sports and cultural activities. The college has active NCC and NSS units. The NSS unit of the college has adopted wards 36 and 88 of the Asansol Municipal Corporation as part of its institutional social responsibility.

In order to fulfill the growing requirements of different departments, students, teachers and non-teaching staff, the two–storied college building was extended by adding a third storey, and more staff quarters for teaching and non-teaching staff, a college canteen, the compound wall, a playground with a



gallery, and the NRS building were constructed. Provisions were made for internal water supply and street lights in the college campus and it was decorated with a garden (the present garden of medicinal plants).

In the early eighties, a new three storied building called Earth Science Building was constructed with grants from the UGC, the Eastern Coalfields Ltd and the Government of West Bengal. In the nineties, an open-air stage was built across the playground of the college. To overcome of lack of adequate space in the library, a new library building was constructed from college funds.

To meet the demands of the local minority population, Post Graduate course in Urdu was started in the college from the session 2009 - 2010. The local M.P. and M.L.A provided LAD funds to construct a new building for the Urdu department.

Trivenidevi Bhalotia College has regular interactions with the local society in Raniganj. The Inter School sports are held in the college playground. Plantation of trees in the college campus has been carried out by the Lions Club of Raniganj.

Most recently, from the session 2015 - 2016, online admission system has been initiated for U.G courses as directed by the Government of West Bengal to introduce transparency in the admission process.

Almost sixty years have passed since the inception of the college- a period during which Trivenidevi Bhalotia College has grown into a large institution which occupies an important place in the Raniganj locality. It now has student strength of about 4546. The college continues in its commitment to provide quality higher education to the populations of Raniganj and the villages and coalfields surrounding it. The Alumni Association of the college bears evidence of this. Since Raniganj is well connected by road and railways and the college has a boys' hostel (the building of a girls' hostel is under process), students from distant places like Bankura, Bishnupur, Durgapur, Dhanbad, Suri etc enroll themselves in the various UG courses and PG course in Urdu offered by the college. Admission in the college is eagerly sought after by students not only because of the variety of courses offered but also because of the learned, competent and dedicated faculty of the college.

#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

While presenting the *Self Study Report* in connection with the accreditation of T.D.B College, Raniganj, Burdwan, West Bengal in the first cycle, the college may be projected as a provider of quality higher education and productive human capital.

A summary of the performance of the college in terms of the seven criteria specified by NAAC is presented below:

#### **Curricular Aspects**

- The college has interactions with beneficiaries like local administrative bodies and others.
- The faculties of the college continuously contribute to the development of curriculum framed by the affiliating university.
- In keeping with the institution's objectives of advancement of job-oriented learning, seeking of affiliation to need based subjects like B.Ed, Biochemistry, journalism, etc is in our agenda what we are going to introduce shortly.
- Networking and interaction with beneficiaries like industry and university have to undertake.
- The College is committed to all-round development of students through academic flexibility, mobility, skill development, progression to higher studies and employability.
- Additional Skill-oriented Programmes relevant to regional and global employment Markets were conducted.
- Gender equality and Human Rights are preserved as per existing rules and regulations of the Government.
- The college has a Career and Counseling Cell for enhancing the awareness of students regarding various post-graduate career options and jobs.
- Lastly, the institution has a student feedback system.

#### **Teaching Learning and evaluation**

- The college has a very good status in higher education. Admission process is very transparent and it is based only on merit and quality of the students, subject to the reservation rules of the government.
- College is sensitive and caring to the differently abled students and backward students.
- Academic sessions, and student assessment are well planned and well organized through class tests, seminars, student-teacher interaction to ensure a healthy and growing atmosphere conducive to teaching and learning.



- An IQAC was formed which is working for the evaluation of teaching quality and promotion of faculties.
- College owns a well equipped library with 67,000 books on various disciplines.
- College-funded and UGC- funded conferences, workshops, seminars, field work, educational tours are arranged to develop advanced level of learning to enrich knowledge.
- Students are engaged in NSS and NCC, organized blood donation camps and various other activities along with their main courses to enrich their social awareness.
- Career counseling, in most subjects are arranged to enable a bright and suitable career for the students.
- A very good number (68) of well- qualified, dedicated full time Govtappointed teaching staff along with 20 part-time teachers, 01 full time contractual, 21 management approved teachers and technical staff are always attentive and vigilant in their duties.
- There is a well structured students' feedback mechanism.

#### **Research, Consultancy and Extension:**

- The college has five faculty members who supervise 18 Ph.D scholars, under different universities.
- Research monitoring cell comprises five faculty members who continuously motivate and encourage the teachers, and post graduate students of Urdu department to engage themselves in research and project work.
- During the last four years three faculty members were engaged on minor research projects and all of which were funded by UGC.
- College has organized National/Departmental seminars during the period of last five years of which 2 were UGC- funded, and the rest were funded by the college.
- College does not have a well organized system for research work. Efforts need to be made in this direction to set up necessary infrastructure for prosecuting research.
- During this period 14 eminent personalities of different fields came to the college for delivering invited lectures.
- College provides leave of different kinds to faculty members to attend seminars and conferences and to prosecute research activities.
- Career Counseling Cell always participates in generating value added Human Resource by conducting the seminars, workshop etc.
- The college promotes extension activities and outreach programs by the NCC cadets and NSS volunteers.



#### Infrastructure and Learning Resources:

To ensure quality in education we have emphasized on developing infrastructure

- Significant budgetary allocation of the Institution for construction and maintenance of buildings and laboratories.
- Three storeyed building containing 30 class rooms for theoretical classes and 16 class rooms for practical classes.
- The laboratories of the college are well equipped.
- One annexure building for Urdu department.
- There are two gardens with Botanical importance.
- These are some common facilities available in the campus : Women's grievance cell, anti ragging cell, Health care, Canteen, Recreational spaces for staff and students, cold and purified drinking water facility, co-operative credit society for staff, boys' and girls' common rooms, open air stage for cultural activities.
- College Library ensures purchase and use of current titles, and other reading materials by spending a considerable amount of money. The college is now looking for to subscribe e- journals in the near future.
- New Central Library building has been set up with a sitting arrangement of 100 students at a time.
- Number of Library books is increasing continuously. Present number of Library books is 67,000.
- Process of automation of Library is under work in progress.
- There is significant budgetary allocation of the Institution for IT infrastructure.
- Numbers of computers are approximately 71 and LCD projectors are 7. Now present Computer and Student ratio is 1:64.
- Up-gradation of Computers with latest software versions and hardware configuration is in continuous process.
- Internet connectivity is present in all departments.
- There exist two playgrounds, one two storied boys' hostel with a capacity of 60 students, improved canteen and sanitary facility, one badminton court and one volley ball court.
- Proposal for construction of a girls' hostel is in the pipeline.



#### **Student Support and Progression:**

- Information is provided to students through college web-site, prospectus and notice boards in strategic positions thereby ensuring commitment and accountability.
- Different types of financial assistance are provided to the students by the college, State Govt and other agencies.
- Participation of students in extra-curricular and co-curricular activities is compulsion in the college.
- Success rates of our students at the University examination is on an average more than 60% in all programmes.
- Institution has a structured mechanism for career guidance of the students.
- Institution is sensitive to grievances and sexual harassment of students.
- The Institution possesses strong NCC and NSS units. Every year NCC cadets participate in National level activities.
- Wall magazine is regularly published by different departments.
- The Institution has a strong alumni association.

#### **Governance, Leadership and Management:**

- The mission of the Institution is to impart value-based result oriented education. The vision is to make the Institution a centre for job-oriented education and research.
- The management of the college is headed by the Governing Body under which there are several committees which work in tandem to design and implement the quality policies and plans, and ensure smooth running of the Institution. Teachers, non-teaching staff and students have representatives in the Governing Body and the various committees.
- The Principal implements the policies and the plans that are adopted by the Governing Body through meeting with different stakeholders.
- The college grooms leadership through granting of autonomy in respect of various aspects to the departments. Leadership among students is developed through activities of the Students' Union, NCC and NSS.
- The aspects considered for inclusion in the perspective plan include introduction of e-classrooms, separate departments for humanities and remedial classes for students lagging behind.



- Proposal for development of research include modernization of laboratories, accessing of e-journals.
- Industry interaction needs to be introduced with relevant departments.
- The Head of the institution gathers information to be presented to the Governing Body through interaction with students, students' feedback and recommendations of various committees.
- The college has yet to apply for autonomy.
- The college has a women's grievance cell and an Anti Ragging Cell.
- There were three court cases filled by ex-employees against the college.
- Teachers are always encouraged to participate in seminars, workshops, orientation programmes and refresher courses.
- Performance appraisal of the teachers is done through student feedback mechanism.
- Welfare schemes available for staff include General Provident Fund, Cooperative Credit Society, medical room and festival advances.
- The Institution invites eminent faculty for delivering lectures in seminars.
- Effective and efficient use of available financial resources is monitored by the Finance Committee.
- The Institution has an organised mechanism for carrying out internal and external audit.
- The IQAC of the college was established on 24/02/2014. It monitors the quality characteristics of the college with co-operation from all stakeholders.

#### **Innovations and Best Practices**

- TDB college has a large green campus with rich bio-diversity.
- Approximately 36% of the college campus is open space with 122 trees, 58 shrubs and 40 herbs.
- Several seminars in connection with best practices are organized by college authority. NSS volunteers actively participate in maintaining the environment- friendly atmosphere in the college. For uninterrupted power supply, two Kirlosker- made smokeless, noise-free green generators was installed in the campus.



- 'Briksho Ropon' utsab is regularly organized.
- Several innovative methods are adopted in the college for the purposes of best practice.
- Innovative practices include continuous evaluation system in the form of class tests, teaching through green board (dust free), participation in mock parliament, participation of students in annual cultural competitions, modern central library with internet (wi-fi facility), safe cold purified drinking water, awareness programmes regarding AIDS and HIV, malaria, dengue etc.

### CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS



#### **1.1. Curriculum Planning and Implementation:**

#### **1.1.1.** Vision of The College

T.D.B. College, Raniganj is a reputed, well known and one of the largest colleges in West Bengal. It is situated in the Asansol subdivision of Burdwan district in the Asansol-Durgapur industrial belt. As it is located in the heart of the industrial belt, this college has the additional responsibility of holding the torch of enlightenment to the mining and urban/ industrial people of this region. Our college has strong faith in the Upanishadic ethos: "Shantam Shivam Adwaitam". By dint of this ethos our learners can achieve the goal as well as perfection in every sphere of life.

#### Mission:

The objective of the college is to make itself a centre of excellence of higher education. Therefore, an endeavour is made to help the students to become skilled, self-confident, self-reliant and well equipped to adjust in this era of globalisation. Special attention is given to create an indomitable spirit among the students and inculcate in them a sense of social responsibility through community development activity.

The students, teachers and non-teaching staff play their roles most sincerely to uphold the education system and its values. Their devotion and dedication are highly appreciable. Students interested in co-curricular activities are always encouraged. The staff do their duties sincerely with belief in the saying "Work is Worship'. Sense of equality, friendly atmosphere and liberty to do rational work in all the academic and administrative functions are upheld in the college

The staff and students are fully aware of the responsibility of providing services to society as a whole. For this, they have to consult and interact with all types of stake-holders, both in and outside the college. The approach in this regard is most friendly and acceptable to all. Transparency, honesty of purpose and sincerity constitute the mission of this institution.

### **1.1.2.** Institutional development and deployment of action plan for effective implementation of the curriculum:

Before the beginning of every academic session, a meeting of the Teachers' Council is convened by the Principal in order to discuss various topics related to admission. After that the essential principles are resolved in the meeting of the academic sub-committee. These resolutions are notified in the notice boards and are circulated among the students, the teachers and the others concerned. The departmental coordinators, teacher representatives of the Governing body, secretary and assistant secretary of the Teachers' Council , general secretary of the students' union and coordinator of IQAC are the members of the Academic Sub-committee. The meetings of the Sub-committee are convened by the



Principal of the College. Extensive discussions are held on the process of implementation of the curriculum as formed by the university and approved by the State Government from time to time. The meeting also considers the convenience and feasibility of deployment of the curriculum in each department. Every department prepares routine following the Master-routine of the College so that the curriculum is properly distributed without hindering the interest of any student or teacher.

## **1.1.3.** Support from the university and institution for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practice support from the university

The college was affiliated to the The University of Burdwan upto 23<sup>rd</sup> June 2015, after which it has become affiliated to the Kazi Nazrul University, Asansol. The syllabus and curriculum framed by the Boards of Studies, The University of Burdwan are being followed by the college. Many teachers from affiliated colleges are members of the Undergraduate Boards of Studies of the affiliating University. They participate in framing of the syllabi. As there is scarcity of teaching and non-teaching staff, the institution tries to fill up this lacuna by providing management approved part time teachers and management approved Contractual teachers/staff. This college always tries to provide modern and updated instruments, and other teaching aids. Educational tours and field excursions organized by the various departments are encouraged with sponsorship from the college. The departments are always encouraged to organize seminars, group discussions, cultural programmes, conferences etc. The teachers take part in UGC sponsored refresher courses, orientation programmes, workshops, seminars to improve their teaching skill and to make themselves updated. These endeavours of the teachers are always given priority by the college authority.

# **1.1.4. Institutional contribution to effective curriculum delivery and transaction**

T.D.B. college is a government sponsored institution and is directly under the Director of Public Instruction (DPI), Govt. of West Bengal. The college is affiliated to the University of Burdwan / Kazi Nazrul University. The UGC is the statutory authority to regulate all other norms. In case of internal matters, the college Governing Body (GB) is the supreme authority.

Every year, UGC sanctions some grants to procure laboratory instruments, library books, computers and other apparatus for development of the curriculum. The college always tries to run with basic ethos of delivering sustainable education to the students with the available infrastructure in coordination with the UGC, Universities, DPI and GB.



### 1.1.5. Networking and interaction with beneficiaries like industry and university

T.D.B. College, being located in the heart of the coal belt in West Bengal, has to undertake various programmes involving Municipal Corporation, media, local administrative bodies, various other organizations and research bodies. Raniganj Sports Association cooperates with the college games department in conducting games and sports in our college. The association also gives training to our students for better performance at the university and state level competitions. The NCC unit of the college motivates cadets to spread the notion of national solidarity and discipline. Local bustee areas are immensely benefitted by NSS volunteers of the college each year. The volunteers also take necessary steps to clean the campus from time to time. Senior teachers of various departments of the college help The School Service Commission, West Bengal, in examining answer scripts each year, and they also take part in the viva test of the Commission. Senior teachers also act as external subject experts in the selection board for appointment of teachers in the neighboring schools and colleges.

The Tata Consultancy Services (TCS), in collaboration with the ministry of Youth Affairs of the Government of West Bengal together with the NSS unit of the college conducted a 10 days employability training programme for grooming of students (total participants 182, male 93, female 89) in February 2015. After a written test and interview, 6 students (2 boys and 4 girls) of III<sup>rd</sup> year of the college were selected by TCS.

## **1.1.6.** Contribution of the institution and staff to the development of curriculum by the university

T.D.B. College is now one of the biggest colleges in West Bengal. The college has now 21 departments with honours courses in arts, science and commerce. The college has great reputation from the very beginning as one of the best affiliated colleges under The University of Burdwan. Almost all the full time teachers of the college serve the universities (both BU and KNU) under various capacities as paper-setters, moderators and examiners. Senior teachers of various departments serve the universities as chairpersons in UG papers and members in boards of studies. The college has to follow the syllabus provided by the concerned board of studies of the universities. Faculty members of the college in various departments are nominated by the university to the syllabus committee. They render great service in making the curriculum need-based and job-oriented. Many teachers of the college serve as part-time teachers at the PG level of various neighbouring universities. Besides these, many teachers provide their services in case of supplying study material and taking part in the job oriented teaching programmes in Department of Distance Education, BU.

The students are asked to submit their feedbacks each year after the completion of their course of study. They evaluate the effectiveness of the curriculum by



assigning grades. The input so obtained are carefully analysed and interpreted for sustainable and all-round development.

# **1.1.7.** Development of curriculum of courses offered (other than those under the purview of the affiliating universities)

All the courses offered (honours and general as well as P.G. in Urdu) are directly under the affiliation of the University of Burdwan and KNU. Other than these, the college provides space to the Institute of Computer Engineers, India, to run some certificate courses in computer science for the benefit of students.

# **1.1.8.** Institutional analysis to ensure the achievement of stated objectives of curriculum in the course of implementation

Class routines are distributed among the students and teachers at the very beginning of the academic session. Each and every department prepares academic programme through departmental meetings which enable students achieve objectives of curriculum. T.D.B. College has been maintaining a high standard of academic quality over a long period. Students of various departments are awarded gold medals from the university which indicates successful achievements of the stated objectives of the curriculum. The college aims at maintaining quality inspite of the load of huge number of students. The graduating students learn to face the competitive world with academic excellence and strong determination.

#### **1.2.** Academic flexibility

## **1.2.1.** Details of the certificate/diploma/skill development courses offered by the institution.

T.D.B. College is committed to ensure all-round development of students. In this regard the college has given permission and provided space to the Institute of Computer Engineers to conduct some certificate courses in computer application. Both in-house and external students are benefitted by these courses.

In near future, for all-round development of career, following job oriented courses will be introduced under the supervision of the career counseling cell of the college and some departments.

# **1.2.3.** Academic flexibility, mobility, skill development, progression to higher studies and employability.

With reference to academic flexibility, our college provides sufficient choices to the students for taking different combination subjects in U.G. general and honours courses. However, interdisciplinary courses have not been introduced. The target is to introduce interdisciplinary subjects like biochemistry, B.Ed., post graduate courses etc. in near future for academic mobility.

#### **1.2.4.** Admission to self-financed programmes

Though the computer science (honours and general) courses were initially started as self-financing programmes, consideration of the weak financial conditions of a large number of people in this locality led the college to decide to bear the financial liability of the computer science department partially. So, the computer science department is no longer self-financed. Admission procedure is similar to other subjects. The course fee is not very high because the college infrastructure is fully utilized.

# 1.2.5. Additional Skill-oriented Programmes, Relevant to regional and global employment Markets.

The Tata Consultancy Services in collaboration with the Ministry of Youth Affairs, Govt. of West Bengal together with the NSS unit of the college conducted an employability training programme from 24<sup>th</sup> February to 6<sup>th</sup> March 2015. Total participants were 182 3<sup>rd</sup> year students.

#### **1.3.** Curriculum enrichment

**1.3.1.** Efforts of the institution to supplement the university's curriculum to ensure that academic programme and institution's goals and objectives are integrated.

The goal of the institution as mentioned earlier is to ensure the holistic development of the students. The following steps are taken are taken in this direction.

1. In addition to following the university curriculum, faculty members use tools like departmental student seminar, student projects etc. to judge and enhance the performance of the students. Continuous assessment of the students is a regular practice.

2. The teachers help the students who are lagging behind.

3. The College has a career and counseling cell which organizes seminars to apprise students of career opportunities. It has also organized grooming sessions for students.

# **1.3.2.** Efforts made by the institutions to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to reflect the students' experience and to cater to the needs of the dynamic employment market.

The curriculum framed by the university is enriched through techniques like group discussions, debate, project works and extensive field studies. Teachers help students to approach the curriculum from the point of view of practical realities. Students are encouraged to develop the habit of regular class attendance, attending library regularly, making themselves up to date through exposure to website. The students of geography department, for example perform survey work in rural mauja to study the lifestyle, food habit, nutrition related problems etc of rural community and suggest remedial measures to overcome the problems. This proves an immense help to the local government/ non-government organization to take necessary steps to alleviate the problems. The physiology department of the college organizes camp work to measure blood pressure, determine blood group, carry out blood test of the surrounding community which help the students to gain experience in such profession. In this way the students can make themselves knowledgeable about their aptitudes as well as needs of the employment market. They can then follow up by doing appropriate job oriented courses.

## **1.3.3.** Institutional effort for integration of gender, climatic change, environmental education, Human Rights, ICT etc into the curriculum.

Our college runs with best efforts from all concerned to ensure gender equality and human rights. The college gives priority to merit in case of admission and no discrepancy is allowed. Human rights of economically challenged groups and backward sections of the society are preserved as per the existing rules and regulations of the Government. Environment studies are mandatory in UG curriculum. A large lush green campus is preserved with great care from all concerned. The NSS volunteers are constantly cleaning and maintaining it as a 'green and clean campus'. Every year tree plantation is organized by the college NSS wing. Students are reminded of their responsibility to keep the campus clean. These practices have thus become part of overall awareness of the students. The institution is trying hard to adopt ICT as an integral part of delivery of lectures and information in the classrooms and seminars. All laboratory-based departments



are provided with computers and internet facilities. Many teachers use audiovisual techniques for delivering lectures. Digitization of library is in process

## **1.3.4.** Value-added courses/ enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students.

No value-added programme has been introduced so far. It is intended to conduct grooming session to train students to face interview for jobs.

#### 1.3.5. Use of feedback from stake-holders in enriching the curriculum.

Feedback of students about old library which was rather congested and had no open access resulted in building of the spacious new library. The necessity for a cycle/bike stand has been taken into consideration.

# **1.3.6.** Institutional monitoring and evaluating quality of enrichment programmes.

The college has a Career and Counseling Cell which organizes seminars and workshops that apprise students about various career options. There is no formal mechanism to monitor and evaluate the quality of the enrichment programme. The response of the students is indicative of the usefulness of the programme. Some successful members of the neighbouring community occassionally shares their experiences and enhances the awareness of students regarding various postgraduate carreer options and jobs.

#### 1.4. Feedback System

### 1.4.1 Contributions of the Institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University:

Many senior teachers of the Institution are active members of the Boards of Studies of different subjects in the affiliating Universities who actively participate in the formation and restructuring of the curriculum.

# **1.4.2** Formal mechanism for obtaining feedback from the students and stake holders and how they are used for curriculum enrichment internally and communication with the University regarding this:

The outgoing students of 3rd year are made to fill up a Feed-back report regarding teaching quality and curriculum. The Institution tries its best to take their suggestions into cognizance, but they are not communicated to the University.



# **1.4.3** New programmes introduce by the Institution during the last four years and the reason for its induction:

In the last four years the Institution has introduced P.G. Course in Urdu due to local demand which is a cause of great encouragement to the minority community of the local and surrounding area.

# **CRITERION – II: TEACHING -LEARNING AND EVALUATION**



#### 2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

# 2.1.1 Ensuring publicity and transparency in the Admission process: *Publicity:*

T.D.B College has a very good reputation in the field of higher education. With a wide range of courses being offered by the college, a very good publicity is ensured in a planned manner. A public notice is displayed on the college notice board as well as in the college website just after the Higher Secondary (+2) results. The notification contains detailed information regarding the number of courses, admission rule, intake capacity, admission fees, eligibility, reservation policy according to government norms, date of submission of application and all the relevant information. In addition to this the college authority and faculty always encourage and motivate the students who show eagerness to join our college.

#### Transparency:

Admission is done strictly on the basis of merit. There is no option of management quota. The college has a transparent admission committee headed by the Principal. Teachers' Council Secretary, coordinators of all the departments, the members of the Governing Body of the college and the general secretary of students' union are the members of this committe. The committee plays an important role in framing the rules of the admission in consistence with the affiliating University rules. Merit list is prepared on the basis of the marks acquired in the H.S. Examinations for the candidates aspiring for Honours courses. The shortlisted names of the candidate are displayed on the notice board and also in the college website. A Counseling Committee headed by the faculties from various departments counsel students and do the necessary steps such as verification of identity and original mark-sheets to ensure equity and social justice through transparency. After counseling of the first phase is over, the college reviews the situation and if there is any vacancy, the next phase of admission is done from the merit list which is based on fresh applications from already admitted students. Admission fees are collected through the banking system. This whole procedure is completed within the pre-announced final date of admission to ensure equality and transparency in the admission system. Online admission system has been initiated from 2015 to introduce greater transparency in the admission process.

(ii) Common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies

(iii)Combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview

(iv)Any other to various programmes of the Institution.

The college runs UG courses for Honours and General courses in Arts, Science and Commerce subjects. Students are selected on the basis of merit i.e. marks obtained in the last board examination. As per university norms students who secure minimum 45% marks in aggregate in H.S level may apply for Honours course. However, the college admission committee fixes the minimum criterion marks for each Honours subject. Merit list is prepared on the basis of 1 language and 3 elective subjects (excluding ENVS).

The subject-wise criteria are different. These are listed below.

#### 2.1.4 Mechanism to review the admission process and student profile:

The college adopted online admission process in 2015. The college always maintained strictly merit base admission and followed Government reservation policy.

The activities of students are closely monitored. A record of their performance in all the fields, academic as well as extra-curricular is maintained. The students with a little bit of negative approach or disturbing attitude are motivated with counseling so that a positive frame of mind can be developed. It helps in developing the students into assets for the institution as well as for the nation. As a result of this process, during the last five years, the college has observed a sharp rise in maintaining the discipline of the students. They have learnt to channelize their energy and their potentials into more constructive activities.

- a. Students from SC/ST/OBC Community:



Students from SC/ST and other backward classes are allotted seats as per policy of the Government. Exemption of fees and other endowment benefits are also extended to a few of them. The college makes tireless efforts to create awareness on the importance of higher studies i.e. education as a means of socio-economic change and a means of empowerment. Regulation of UGC and the policy of Constitutionally Guaranteed Merit-cum-Reservation at the time of admission are strictly adhered to. The college makes sure that an awareness and orientation on the financial and academic facilities, incentives to the marginalized students are categorically framed. At present the reservation quota is as follows:

# SC: 22%, ST: 6%, PH : 3%, OBC-A:3 %, OBC-B:7% (For the Session 2015 – 2016)

Reservation is ensured at UG and PG levels of admission. Efforts are made to induct them in NSS and NCC.

#### b. Women:

For women, there is no reservation for admission but the female candidates are provided with equal opportunity. The college provides counseling to the needy parents of women students thereby lauding stress on the importance of women education, exclusive facilities available for women, financial incentives and security as well as protection is provided. Free books and other incentives are provided to the female students by different departmental teachers.

#### c. Differently-abled:

There is reservation for students belonging to differently abled categories as per UGC notifications. Special attention is given to their requirements and needs. The college has made ramps in front of the Canteen, Administrative office, Library and toilets to facilitate the movements differently-abled students.

#### d. Economically Weaker Sections of the Society:

There is a special facility for students belonging to economically weaker sections of the society. They are financially facilitated at the discretion of the Principal. They are also given benefits like fee concession, free books and remedial coaching etc.

#### e. Minority:

The college under the direction from the Central Government, State



Government and its affiliating university offers every possible help to the students belonging to the minority community. College helps the minority students in all aspects. The college boasts of a separate annex for the Department of Urdu, where Urdu is taught at both UG and PG levels.

In some departments like electronics, economics, statistics the number registered students are decreasing. In electronics Hons there is no scope for post graduate study in our university. In Economics Hons there is little scope for job prospect in our state. In statistics Hons we hardly get students having motivation in this subject. College authority is earnestly trying to overcome this situation by consulting university level authority and other govt and non-govt sectors.

#### 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

# 2.2.1 The needs of differently-abled students and ensuring adherence to government policies:

The college always takes due care of the needs of differently-abled students whenever they come across the notice of the administration. Policy laid down in the governing body of the college is fully complying with the prevailing educational policy of the Government of West Bengal. The following opportunities are available for those students:

1. Reservation of seats at the time of admission in all disciplines is strictly maintained as per Government norm. The admission process is highly transparent and there is no discrimination.

2. College Library is on the ground floor.

3. College allows writers for students with functional and visual difficulty in the Examination Hall by taking permission from university authority. Moreover, the college has made some special arrangement for students with transmitable diseases to meet their College have made some special arrangement for the students with transmitted diseases to meet their



requirement.

4. Special counseling/Lecture sessions are occasionally arranged for those differently-abled students. Teachers always take special initiative to encourage such students so that there is no disparity in their educational/performance. Special classes are arranged for slow learners so that they may maintain parity with the general class.

5. Provision of allowing extra time during examinations as per University norm is also meticulously adhered to.

# 2.2.2 Assessment of the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme: A detailed summary

The College has a proper assessment system to cater to the needs of students in terms of knowledge and skills before admission to any honours course. College education is the turning point for a student aspiring for higher studies. The Institution has its own machinery and with the instruction of the head of the institution, the approved authority which is entitled to assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills usually gears up the machinery at the time of admission. The College mainly assesses a student on the basis of his previous results and records. University circulates guidelines to the affiliated colleges for the admission to different courses. Apart from these, academic sub-committee of the college, a body constructed by the Governing Body frames few more stringent rules to get a core subject in a certain course.

The academic sub-committee attempts to emphasize the following for assessment during the admission:

- > Academic and Co-curricular Records.
- Intention and interest in subjects.
- Specific aim in life.
- Social and Economic Background.

Teachers in every department initiate post-admission counseling to the students informing about the course, duration, academic rules and regulations, as also future prospects of the subject. The knowledge, skills, expectation and interest of the students relating to the subject in which they have been enrolled are assessed by the concerned within the first few classes. Administration puts forward a notice of subject change and with




the advice of the teacher; enrolled students take privilege of the notice and switch over to the subject according to their knowledge and skills. To cope up with the opportunities of getting jobs and higher studies, the college also has a career guidance cell for counseling the students. Apart from these, most of the departments organize seminars and career counseling workshops on higher studies and discuss in detail the various job opportunities that the relevant subjects can provide.

# 2.2.3 Strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice:


The College is situated near the border of Bankura district of the State of West Bengal. Most of the students are from remote areas of rural Bankura as also remote coal-mining areas with poor communicative skills who are economically backward and less competent in their major subjects. Elaborate discussions on a topic, clarification of subject matters, notes and suggestions transform those reserved students into good students. Moreover, many departments set introductory classes for some students with no sound knowledge in the subject. College teaching staff are easily accessible for the students at any time during the college hours. College has no arrangement for Bridge/Add on/Enrichment courses etc. in its curriculum.


# 2.2.4 Sensitizing the College staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.

T.D.B. College is a co-educational institution having multidisciplinary course structure in arts, commerce and science. Since inception, the college has a rich heritage on pedagogy. Taking into account the socio-economic background of the students, teachers of the college always impart their education by conglomeration of moral, ethical, environmental and social education along with the deeper understanding of the subjects. Different wings of the college organize awareness programmes on environmental issues, biodiversity etc. We need not take special effort to sensitize gender balance among students and staff because over the years female students have been admitted in quite a good number in the college.











The safety and freedom of the girl students of the college are ensured. Apart from the college activity, two NSS units (one for boys and the other for girls) of the college organize various programs like celebration of Independence Day, Republic Day etc. in their diverse capacity. In several NSS camps and NCC programs, student volunteers, non-teaching staff and teaching staff avail the opportunity of working together for the people of adjoining areas of the college. In those programs the college cater to the needs of the under-privileged section of the society by way of making awareness among them. The students as also the underprivileged people of the adjoining areas are taught the importance of cleanliness and sanitation as also the need for planting trees to improve the ecological balance. Respective NSS officers forward their directives regarding road safety. Celebration of "Yuva Diwas", Tree Plantation programmes, Thalassemia and AIDS Awareness programmes, 'Banomohaotsab' week etc. are carried out by the student volunteers along with the other students of the college and they perform all this wholeheartedly in a planned and effective manner.

- Arranged "Swachha Bharat Abhiyan" and made procession for campaign.
- Special camp held from 7<sup>th</sup> -13<sup>th</sup> January, 2012 at Manasatala, Bauripara, Slum areas of Raniganj. Seminars, Workshops and Street Plays organised on different topics like awareness of Health Drug Abuse, Environmental Pollution, etc.
- Two girls and three boys participated round the clock in an Inter College Camp organised by Durgapur Government College from 7<sup>th</sup>-13<sup>th</sup> January, 2012.

- Participate in social activities like blood donation, tree plantation, medical aid camps, etc. The above activities promote courage strength, duty and discipline.

# 2.2.5. Identification and response of the Institution to special Educational /learning needs of advanced learners?

Group discussions are held in the respective departments, regular syllabus based class tests are held to monitor the merit and improvement level of the students. Special Students- Seminars are held in Honours subjects to inspire the advanced learners. Departmental exhibitions are held during the annual celebration week where the academic and practical prowess of the stuednts is showcased.

2.2.6. Collection, analysis and use of the data and information on the academic performance (through the program duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc.)?

The College has adopted following steps to collect data on academic performance:

- a) Collection of academic record from admission file
- c) Percentage of attendance in the theoretical & practical class
- d) Marks scored in class test.
- e) Response, interaction and active participation in the theoretical & practical class
- f) Students' behaviour and attitude inside the campus
- g) Involvement in co-curricular activities

h) Observing the participation of students in different cultural program organized in the college campus.

i) Backward and shy students are encouraged to participate and show their latent talents.



#### **2.3 Teaching-Learning Process**

# 2.3.1 Planning and Organizing the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules. (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.) Academic calendar:

At the beginning of each academic session the college prepares the academic calendar based on the calendar of the affiliating university. Since the college was affiliated to Burdwan University the syllabus was primarily framed by the university. From 24<sup>th</sup> June, 2015 the college has come under the affiliation of Kazi Nazrul University, Asansol and therefore the 1<sup>st</sup> year curriculum has been prepared by the said University. The whole academic session of 12 months starting from July to June is

sub- divided into three terms:

1st term begins from July and continues up to Puja vacation ;

**2nd term** commences after Puja vacation and continues up to winter recess.

**3rd term** from 1st January to April after which the University evaluation process commences.

#### > Organization of evaluation schedule:

The College holds centralized examinations once every year, the final test. These examinations are held for first-year, second-year and third-year students. Results of these examinations are published. Answer scripts are shown to the students and the scheme of evaluation is explained. Model answers are discussed for the benefit of the students. Unit tests and tutorial classes are held regularly by the departments in order to impart more knowledge and skills. Besides these tests, students' presentation in seminars also helps in monitoring students' performance before the university examinations.

#### **>** Teaching Plan:

Teaching plan is prepared at departmental level well in advance before commencing the academic session for better understanding of the workload and completion of the syllabus within the specified time frame. Coordinators of the various departments seek opinion of departmental teachers regarding distribution of syllabus by conducting departmental meetings. The teachers have liberty to put their preferences in teaching a particular area of curriculum. However, through the formal and even informal discussions in some cases among the teachers, the teaching plan is





finalised . It includes the topics to be taught and the number of classes required by individual teachers during the specified period of time. A reasonable degree of flexibility is allowed to the academic departments in preparing the teaching plan. This whole process is informally conducted at the discretion of the concerned departments. A system of students' feedback has been introduced in the recent past. A central time table is prepared by the Routine Sub-committee and following that departmental time table is prepared by the Co-ordinator of the individual departments and displayed on the Notice Board. A departmental time table along with a copy of time table of individual teachers is also submitted to the Principal for verification.

#### Evaluation Blue Print

With a view to assessing progress of the students, there is a system of internal

assessment generally conducted by the individual departments. The schedule of examination prepared by different departments is displayed on the Notice Board. At the same time students are informed in the class the portion of syllabus to be examined. In this way the students are evaluated by the respective departments on a regular basis. Students having poor performance undergo remedial coaching. The final evaluation is done through University schedule.

# 2.3.2 Contribution of IQAC to improve the teaching – learning process. Functions carried out by the IQAC to improve the teaching-learning process with administrative, academic extension activities, research and knowledge resource extension

IQAC cell was formed on 24.02.2014 by Resolution No.2802 of the Governing Body of the college as an agency to improve and enhance the overall educational environment and its different components to ensure a smooth functioning of the teaching –learning process of the college. IQAC cell gives valuable suggestions regarding introduction of new courses, research and development planning, conducting seminars, workshops, career-counseling, empowering faculty.

IQAC conducts meeting for the improvement of the faculties for research and upgradation. This cell provides some quality benchmark/parameters for monitoring and developing quality in respect of various academic, administrative and co-curricular activities of the Institution. It also



disseminates information on quality aspects and monitors different quality measures to restore and uplift the quality of the Institution as a whole. However, the IQAC considers and analyses students' feedback, their progress in internal assessment, the use of library resources, effective use of existing infrastructural facilities and additional requirement thereof, facilities provided for enrichment of teachers' knowledge to improve the quality of teaching-learning process.

# 2.3.4 Nurturing critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators:

The college nurtures critical thinking among the students by organizing seminars, educative exhibitions etc. in which students can explore new ideas having a chance to listen to the views of distinguished academicians particularly in the seminar. The teachers motivate the students in writing for publication in the annual magazine and wall magazine for embracing creativity. Teachers also create interest among the students to nurture creativity by providing guidance. Drawing posters, pioneering thinking, are encouraged where each student tries to contribute with his/her own originality. Scientific temper is developed among the students in different theoretical and practical classes.

2.3.5 Technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching: Eg: Virtual laboratories, e- learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning(NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

Though situated nearly 200 kms away from the Capital of the state, the college tries its best to provide technological facilities to its students and faculty within its limited funds. The institution provides:

- 1) 7 LCD projectors
- 2) 3 Overhead Prjectors

3) Computer with internet facilities in all science and commerce departments and in Humanities and Geography departments.

4) TNT-Mips software in Geography department.



5) Power point presentation is used in some departments.

The faculties are allowed to undergo Orientation Programmes, Refresher Courses and other related training programmes. They are also allowed to participate and present papers in different state-level, national and international seminars, workshops, conferences etc. to enrich their level of knowledge and skill.

# 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students/benefitted) on the academic, Personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/ mentoring/ academic advice) provided to students:

Academic supports are given in terms of classroom teaching, (100%) Tutorial classes (15-18%) Class test (100%), evaluation of answer script (100%)

The teachers of our college act as academic advisors and guide the students rather than acting only as class teacher and when they get any hint about the personal problem of any student, they put every effort to resolve that as much as possible. There are instances of providing monetary help by the teachers to the needy students when they face financial difficulty to meet the requisite fees for pursuing/continuing their study. Sometimes such help is also extended to the students for their admission into P. G. courses.

#### 2.3.8 Details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years. Efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and its impact on student learning:

As mentioned under 2.3.3 above, various methods are adopted by the teachers to make learning effective as well as interesting. The college authority always encourages teachers to practice innovative method provided the fund permits the same. Whenever any new grant is available the authority asks for proposals from the departments for utilization of the funds. The departments are given full liberty to choose the equipments / softwares / materials to be purchased and are supplied to the respective departments on the basis of emergent necessity.



# **2.3.9 Utilization of library resources to augment the teaching-learning process:**

The college has a well-equipped partly computerized library having more than 68,000 books including text books, reference books, advanced books, journals and periodicals on various subjects, which remains open from 8 am to 5 pm on every working day. There are many old and rare books and journals as also very ancient and rare Sanskrit manuscripts. Teachers and students visit the library regularly. There are other support services available in the library, for example, broad band connection in the library and computer facility. Digitization of library access process is going on. We are in the process of accessing online journals and books through INFILBNET.

# **2.3.10.** The challenges the Institution faces in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar:

The data of the last four years shows that out of the total classes allotted almost 80% of the classes have been performed. Given the length and detail of our syllabus, especially for the Honours students, the number of teaching days available appears insufficient for the completion of the same. The challenge for the teachers is to efficiently and satisfactorily complete the syllabus especially in the sessions where elections are held.

#### **2.3.11.** Monitoring and evaluating the quality of teaching learning:

Quality of teaching is evaluated through the feed-back from the students. Classroom attendance of the students is closely monitored Continuous assessment by regular class test and course examination. Principal and the faculty members meet to improve the quality of teaching.



The college has appointed one Fulltime Govt. Approved faculty (Contractual Whole Time Teacher, CWTT) in the Department of Computer Science. There are also 20 Govt approved Part-time teachers. Four Management approved Contractual Teacher/Technical staff in the Departments of Mathematics, Sanskrit, Commerce and Physics and Management approved class based teachers.

The college brings to the notice of teachers each and every research grant, particularly those offered by the UGC. It plays a proactive role in preparing and submitting such proposals.

The College has introduced evaluation of the teachers by the outgoing Honours students, on a regular basis and submitted report to the Principal. The students' feedback is carefully analyzed and the strengths and weaknesses in their teaching method are analyzed. Evaluation of teachers by the external peers is done at the time of promotion.

The Burdwan University to which the college was affiliated had modified the old syllabus in 2014-15 session of most of the subjects. College accordingly introduced the modified syllabus. Recently, after the college became a part of Kazi Nazrul University, the syllabi and programmes have been rescheduled to meet their requirements. Apart from this, the answer scripts for College examinations are evaluated following the general pattern of instructions given for evaluating university examination answer scripts. For science subject some new instruments are supplied according to the syllabus. As per the university new norms few marks are allotted in different departments for internal assessment of practical.

#### 2.5.4 Details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adapted to measure student achievement. A few examples which have positively impacted the system.

To transform an ordinary student into an advanced learner, a continuous evaluation process is essential in an educational institution. An incessant monitoring system for a student during a session may be called a formative evaluation. It can be used by a teacher to improve or change his/her teaching style to make the class more impressive and interesting. On the other hand, he/she can also contemplate on the position of a student in the context of the topics discussed in the previous classes.

College usually conducts the formative assessment of students in various ways like:

awareness campaign.

As the institution is an affiliated college there is little scope for these. However in order to ensure transparency answer scripts of all test examinations organized by the college / departments are shown to the students.





Our students meet the challenges of a changing world through pragmatic and professionally oriented learning. The college provides special coaching facilities for the UG student. Apart from optimizing the syllabi and updating the teaching methodology, the students are motivated towards achieving the best outcomes of the teaching-learning process. The college closely monitors all these programmes.

### 2.6.3 Teaching learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes.

The strategies of teaching, learning and assessment and its structuring are determined by the learning outcome and these strategies of this institution are integrative in order and consistent. They are designed in a way to ensure that the learning outcomes are successfully achieved. The BOS of different subjects of University takes sufficient initiative for planning and mapping to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcomes. Faculty ensures the essential balance between lectures, seminars,



independent and collaborative learning activities in the programme, Feedback from the outgoing Honours students help us to assess whether the learning outcomes are achieved.

# 2.6.4 Measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (quality jobs, entrepreneurship innovation and research aptitude) of the courses offered:

In the introductory classes of any course, the teachers make the newcomer students aware of the social and economic relevance of the courses. Teachers focus on how the study of the courses can be economically and socially significant by explaining the job opportunities and scope in further studies and research work in the subjects. During the courses, departments organize seminars, lectures to discuss the issues relating to the impact of studying the subjects on the society. The college also organizes seminars and talks by experts to emphasize on the prospects of studying different subjects.

### 2.6.5 Institution's method in collecting and analyzing data on student learning outcomes and using it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning:

College gathers systematically data of all the examinations. Faculties sit in meeting regarding the progress of the assessment and further progress.

Departments arrange for remedial classes for the students whose progresses are not satisfactory.

#### 2.6.6 Monitoring process and details of the achievement of learning outcomes.

The departmental output regarding the students' performance is regularly discussed in Teachers' Council meeting. The problems are noted and possible outcomes are suggested in the meeting. The concerned department implemented the suggestions and reported the feedback to the next council meeting.

Yes. The College holds arrange a final Test for each year. These examinations are taken for first-year, second-year and third-year students. Results of these examinations are published centrally. Teachers individually take class test in a regular basis.

### CRITERION III: RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION



Trivenidevi Bhalotia College has always encouraged its faculty members and students to engage in research work and extension activities. However, it has yet to make a foray into consultancy services, the scope of which is limited. Most of the teachers are involved in research work. Teachers and students are encouraged to attend conferences and seminars organised by the college, as well as those held in other institutions. It is mandatory for UG students in their third year to submit projects in Environmental science. In this the teachers guide the students to work on contemporary issues.

#### 3.1 Promotion of Research:

A majority of teachers are engaged in research activities – some to obtain Ph.D degrees, some in post doctorate work and others as supervisors of research scholars. Many of these faculty members present papers in National and International conferences and seminars. The college provides assistance to the researchers in the form of library facilities, laboratory and sabbatical leave.

#### 3.1.1 Research Centres:

Although the college encourages its faculty and students to engage in research activities, there is no organised system to facilitate research. A research centre that functions as a support system to encourage and enable teachers to undertake research along with teaching is yet to be set up.

#### 3.1.2 The Research Committee of The College:

The college has a Research Committee the composition of which is as follows:

The committee was formed with a view to encourage and assist faculty members to apply for externally funded research project.

### 3.1.3 Measures Taken by the Institution for Smooth Progress and Implementation of Research Schemes / Projects

The Institution provides infrastructural facilities such as laboratory, library, computers and internet to facilitate research.

### **3.1.4 Developing Scientific Temper, Research Culture and Aptitude among Students**

• Undergraduate students in their third year have to undertake projects in Environmental Science. Faculty members guide them to work on subjects of current interest.



- Competitive stalls are set up by students at the annual exhibition. Various themes of current social and scientific importance are taken up by these stalls.
- Students also participate in poster competitions in seminars organised by the college. Eighteen students of the Physiology Department participated in poster award competition (UG level) at the Physiological Survey of India Conference (PHYSICON), 2014, held at Baharampur Girls' College. Of these, three students were awarded the third prize for their research project entitled 'Musculoskeletal Disorders in Housemaids'.
- Some departments like Geography, Botany, History and Political Science organise seminars by teachers, delegates and also students.

### **CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES**



The basic aim of the college is to provide quality higher education to the large population of students of the coalfields and rural areas surrounding Raniganj. Student enrollment is the main strength of the college. In this regard, development of proper infrastructure to facilitate the teaching learning process has been of utmost importance to this institution. The introduction of new courses over time necessitated the expansion of the existing infrastructure. The college has always responded by providing appropriate facilities to aid the teaching learning process.

#### 4.1 Physical Facilities

Adequate physical infrastructure is essential for providing a peaceful and comfortable environment to both students and teachers for effective teaching and learning. The college has always been committed to provide the necessary infrastructure.

#### 4.1.1 Policy of the Institution for Creation and Enhancement of Infrastructure

The policy for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning is framed by the Governing Body of the college in consultation with the Teachers' Council, Academic Committee and Development Committee. Two basic criteria that are considered during the formation of policy are:

- (a) Need of the college
- (b) Demand of the local society

(a) <u>Need of the college</u> : Most policies framed for creation and enhancement of infrastructure have been to meet the needs of the college. The most recent addition to the existing infrastructure consisting of large class rooms, laboratories, a boys' hostel, staff quarters, canteen, a separate transformer is the new library building. The college possesses approximately 67,000 books in the library. The old library which was situated on the top floor of the main building had a capacity of 40,000 books. Further, the bookshelves and reading space were in the same large hall. This precluded open access to the bookshelves. Thus, in order to keep the 67,000 books properly and also to facilitate open access to the bookshelves, the Governing Body of the college took a decision to construct a new modern library outside the main building of the college. Construction was completed in 2013. The books in the old library have already been shifted to the new building and the library is now functional.

By construction of the new library building effectiveness of learning has been achieved in the following ways:

- (1) Proper preservation of the 67,000 books.
- (2) The whole library is now openly accessible.
- (3) Seating capacity of students in the reading room has been increased from 50 to 100.
- (4) As the library is now situated outside the main academic building, it remains open and can be used by students during the University Examinations.
- (5) The space vacated by the old library in the main building can now be utilized effectively for opening new rooms for the arts departments.

(b) <u>Demand of the local society</u> : The college is located in an area with a large minority population.\_To promote education to the minority community, the college from the beginning, has started undergraduate course in Urdu. However, there was an overwhelming pressure from the local community to start a post graduate course in



Urdu. Yielding to this pressure, the Governing Body of the college decided to open a post graduate course in Urdu under the University of Burdwan. The P.G. course was initiated in the year 2009-2010.

In order to conduct post graduate classes and also to set up a separate Urdu department, the college has constructed a new Urdu P.G. building using mainly M.L.A and M.P. LAD funds.

#### 4.1.2 Facilities for Curricular, Co-curricular and Extra Curricular activities

(a) <u>Curricular activities</u> :- The curriculum of the college includes M.A.(Urdu), B.Sc.(Hons and General), B.A. (Hons and General) and B.Com (Hons and General) and the students get admitted every year in these curricular activities. All the class rooms are provided with dust free green boards. The list of other facilities provided by the college authorities are given below:-

#### B.Sc.

#### 1. Physics:

- Two illuminated and airy class rooms attached with department of Physics each having capacity of 30 students are provided by college authority for taking honours classes.
- Two illuminated and airy class room (Room no 67 and 72) having capacity of 120 students in each room are provided for taking general classes. Each room has dust free green board.
- LCD Projector with laptop is used occasionally for taking honours classes
- Three personal computers, one is connected with internet.
- Four practical class rooms for honours students, each having capacity of 20 students.

Different experiments are set up in these rooms. One dark room for doing the practical class related to optics.

- Two practical class rooms for the students of general stream.
- Some of the important instruments which are used by the students are :
- (a) Spectrometer (b) CRO (c) Magnetron (d) Ballistic galvanometer (e) Platinum resistance thermometer (f) Function generator
- Instruments are kept in the steel almirahs with locking facilities. Key is always kept in the department under the custody of the storekeeper.
- Seminar library has 174 books which are regularly issued to the students.

The college always encourages students to participate in extracurricular activities like sports, games, cultural activities, etc.

#### • Sports and Games:

The Institution has a large playground of 5825.4798 sq meter area with galleries built on one side. Students play football and cricket here. There is one Volleyball court of 2175.1917 sq meter area outside the boys' hostel and one cemented badminton court of area 442.5012 sq meter between the main building and the Science building. The Annual sports are held in these





grounds . The common rooms for boys and girls are equipped with facilities for indoor games like Table tennis and Carom.

One of the student of the college participated twice and was ranked in the State- level Athletic Meet of Non-Government colleges conducted by the Director of Public Instruction. Inter- class football championship, and cricket matches are held every year. The College football team participated in football championship matches with other colleges under The University of Burdwan. During the Annual sports a tug- of war takes place between students and the staffs which is enjoyed by both the groups. (Teaching & Non-teaching). Both girls and boys compete in the table tennis and carom championship.

#### • <u>Gymnasium</u>

The college intends to set up a well equipped gymnasium in some of the vacant quarters.

#### Health Centre

The college has a health centre attended by a part-time general physician.

#### Wall Magazine

Boards are provided to departments for the setting up of wall magazines. Students get the opportunity to showcase their creative abilities in writing and painting.

#### <u>Cultural Activities</u>

The college has an open – air stage where students perform during the Annual Social Function. Professionals are also invited to entertain the students. One act play competitions are here. The teachers and non-teaching staff also stage separate plays. The Annual function is funded by the college. Every year in collaboration with students union, the college organizes an exhibition cum competition among different departments.

#### • <u>National Service Scheme (NSS)</u>

The college has two active NSS units with boys and girls. They are headed by Smt. Chandana Khan, a trained programme officer. They obtain a fund of Rs 90,000 per year from the affiliating University for their activities. The NSS has an office room, a storeroom and other necessary equipments.

#### • <u>National Cadet corps (NCC)</u>

The college has an active unit of NCC with captain (Dr.) Ganesh Kumar Rajak in charge. In the current session there are 43 boys and 26 girls as cadets. Many cadets have participated and won medals in different State level and national level shooting championships. The NCC unit consists of an office and a storeroom and is situated on the ground floor of the NRS building. All equipments are provided by 10 Bengal Br, NCC, Asansol Coy-03.



#### • <u>College Co-operative Society</u>

A co-operative credit society comprising teachers and non-teaching staff is operated by the college for hassle free loans to members with minimum delay and at a nominal interest rate.

#### • Medicinal Garden

There is a garden of medicinal plants in the college and one of ornamental plants having area 938.0059 & 317.670 sq meter respectively.

The present infrastructure is optimally utilized. However to provide better facilities many areas of development are under consideration. These are as follows:-

- Space for all laboratories in the Science departments.
- Audio system for general students in the Arts and Commerce stream
- Internet connected linguistic practical lab for language departments
- Initiation of some vocational training classes



#### 4.1.4: <u>Disabled-friendly Infrastructure</u> :

In order to enable free movement of disabled individuals, ramps have been provided in all important places in the campus. The reading room of the library and the canteen are on the ground floor.

#### 4.1.5 : Details of the Residential Facilities and Various other Provisions:

The college provides residential facilities to its students, teachers and non-teaching staff.

<u>1. Hostel facility</u> – The College has one hostel for male students which occupies about 10 percent of the total area of the college campus. It is a two storied building with a capacity for housing 60 students.

The hostel has 34 rooms which are of three types: two, three and four-seated rooms. Electricity is provided by the college.

The dining room of the Hostel is furnished with benches and tables. There is one wash basin with running water connection. The kitchen is well – stocked with utensils.

A well covered by a iron net is one extra source of water. Besides, there is a running water connection from Asansol Municipal Corporation. Overhead water tanks provide 24 hours water supply in the hostel.

There are three bath rooms – cum toilets on each floor. An individual has been employed by the college to clean the toilets regularly.

The hostel is attached to a playground where the residents of the hostel play volleyball. A garden is also maintained by them in the hostel premises.

- A gymnasium has been proposed to be set up in a vacant quarter.
- A computer / internet facility is to be installed shortly in the hostel.
- Library facilities to be set up in the hostel.
- In case of medical emergencies the general physician, attached to the college on a temporary basis, is called. If necessary, he advices the concerned student to be hospitalized.
- The college has 39 quarters for the teaching staff, of which 15 are one storied bungalow types having three rooms. The remaining 24 quarters are two roomed apartments with 24 hours water supply. Each quarter is provided with a wooden cot, a table and a chair.
- One quarter is used as the NSS office, another as maintenance office and two quarters have been converted to Sanskrit department.
- There is a Teachers' guesthouse with 12 rooms. Each room has an attached bath.
- The college has 43 quarters for non-teaching staff.
- The hostel has a common room with indoor games. Newspapers are subscribed for the inmates of the hostel.
- Security: Security guards are provided in the main gate of the college and the small back gate of the college and they guard the college campus round the clock.

#### 4.1.6: <u>Campus Health Care for Students and Staff</u>:

A medical unit with first-aid facilities is situated near the main gate of the college. A general physician visits the unit every Thursday morning on a



temporary basis. In case of any emergency he is given a call and appropriate actions are taken based on his advices.

#### 4.1. 7: <u>Common Facilities Available for Special Units in the College Campus</u>:

#### 4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

The library which is a storehouse of knowledge forms an integral and vital part of the college. It is situated in a separate building constructed solely for this purpose. The library has about 67,000 books and several ancient Sanskrit manuscripts. Apart from the main library, seminar libraries have been set up in different departments so that honours students may borrow a book or use it for ready reference. Then manual system of handling books is now in the process of being replaced by a computerized system.

#### 4.2 .1 Library Advisory Committee

The library has an advisory committee (LAC) comprising the Principal of the college, the librarian as the convener, six teachers and two non-teaching staff. Regular meetings of the committee are held to review the functioning of the library. Seminar libraries have been set up in the different departments with the initiative of the LAC. This committee also takes decisions for procuring books which are useful for students. The process of computerization of the system of functioning of library is being monitored by the LAC.

#### 4.2 .2 Library layout

The library is situated in a separate building in the college campus. It has a total area of 567.610 sq meters. The library is well- ventilated with a peaceful ambience. The reading room for students has a seating capacity of 100. There are, however, no separate arrangements for girl students. A separate room is provided for faculty members with a seating capacity of 10.

The college is run in two shifts – morning and day. For students enrolled in the morning shift, the library is open from 7.00 a.m. to 9.30 a.m., and for those in the day shift from 11.00 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. from Monday to Friday and from 10.30 a.m. to 1.00 p.m. on Saturday.

#### 4.2.3 Library Plan and Amount spent for reading materials and eresources, library purchase and use (Library Budget)

The library has a well organized system of purchasing books. Books are purchased every year from the College and sometimes U.G.C. also provides some funds to buy books. The Librarian in consultation with the Principal issues notices to different departments for submission of titles of books together with the number of copies to be purchased, subject to a given budget. It may be mentioned here that text books are given greater priority. The Principal, in consultation with the librarian, then issues a tender notice which is put up on the College Notice Board and also published in newspapers. Books are then procured from a supplier considering his capacity, capability, terms of payment, past experience, commission given to the college and the lowest quotation value.

\* Due to some unavoidable circumstances books could not be procured in the financial year 2014-2015. However the entire amount allocated for the session was transferred to the session 2015-2016 and books purchased accordingly.

Although allocations were made in the annual budgets for purchase of Journals and e- resources during the last four years, none were procured. This is a limitation of our library system. However, to overcome this lacuna the governing body in its meeting held on 17.10.2015 sanctioned an amount of Rs. 42,000/- (Rs. 2,000/- per department) for the procurement of Journals in the library [vide Misc (XI)]. Regarding e-journals, preliminary work has been started in the library like providing internet connections to it and also to other departments. It is expected that e-journals will be accessed in the near future.

#### 4.2.4 <u>Details of the ICT and other Tools Deployed to Provide Maximum Access</u> to the Library Collection

The computerization of the system of functioning in the library is in progress. It is expected to be completed by February 2016 after which students and teachers will be able to avail of advanced computer aided search facilities/packages. It is intended to install Computer packages such as OPAC, Electronic Resource Management Package, Federated Searching Tool used to search articles.

The details are as follows:

- Electronic Resource management package for e-journals yet to be installed
- Federated searching tools to search articles in multiple databases yet to be installed
- No separate website has been developed for the library. The website of the college contains information about the library regarding its activities, number of titles, etc.

### 4.2 .7 <u>Support provided by the library staff to the students and teachers of the college</u>

- The library staff is always cordial to the students and teachers.
- These are six members in the library staff to support nearly 4000 students and 80 teachers.
- In the reading room the library staff provide books to students and teachers immediately on demand since books for reading room are kept separately.
- In the lending section, the library staff take less than 30 minutes to issue books to students and teachers.

#### 4.2 .8 Library Facilities for the differently abled

Physically disabled students are given preferential treatment in issuing books.

#### 4.2.9 Feedback Mechanism

The college has introduced a system to get the feedback of the students regarding the infrastructure of the college, including the library. Every year, after completion of their curriculum, students are given feedback forms where they are asked to rate the different facilities provided by the college. The filled up forms submitted to the college are then analyzed by a committee of teachers under the supervision of the Principal. An analysis based on a small sample of students graduating in 2014 shows:

- 26% of the students voted for 'excellent'
- 29% of the students found the library facilities to be very good
- Only 3% of the students voted for 'poor'

The Principal, along with the library committee, reviews the report and steps are taken to improve library facilities.

Some of the challenges facing the library are:

- The number in the library staff must be increased.
- A separate librarian is required for the Morning Shift.
- There should be provision of air- conditioning in the library.
- There should be provision for differently abled students.

#### 4.3. IT Infrastructure

The Institution is aware of the necessity to provide I T facilities to enable teachers and students to take advantage of the advanced ICT. It has, therefore, taken the initiative to provide computing and internet facilities in different departments.

#### 4.3.1 Details on the Computing Facility available in the Intuition

The college provides computing facilities to the students, teachers and staff with 71 computer systems and internet connectivity.

#### 4.3.5. ICT Enabled Teaching Learning in the Institution

The college is gradually shifting to computer aided teaching learning, though the chalk and talk process continues. Many departments, like Physiology, use LCD projector along with laptop for delivering lecturers. It is planned to develop ICT enabled classrooms for departments in the faculty of Arts.

In regard to computer aided teaching learning, internet facilities have been provided to all the Science departments. LCD projectors along with laptops have been provided to some departments like Physiology, Physics, Chemistry, Geology, Zoology, and Botany.

Commerce department is also provided with computers having Internet facilities.

Regarding Arts departments, college has taken decision in its G.B. to provide internet facilities, LCD projectors, Laptops and Desktop computers to the respective departments.

#### 4.3.6. Learning Activities and Technologies for Student- centric Teaching

Not much has been achieved in this direction. Classes are conducted in some departments using LCD projectors and laptops. Audio- visual methods are used in some language departments. Students of different departments are given the access to computers to develop their stalls for the Annual exhibition of the college. These students use the internet and other computing facilities to develop their themes.

#### 4.4 Maintenance of Campus Facilities

#### 4.4.1 Optimum <u>Allocation and Utilization of Financial Resources For</u> <u>Maintenance and Upkeep of college Infrastructure</u>

In order to ensure optimum utilization of financial resources, management has appointed a responsible person, the bursar of the college, who is vigilant about the maintenance and needs of all equipments, computers etc, furniture and building. He helps the regard the management in this regard.



Departmental heads inform the Principal about all departmental requirements after holding departmental meetings. Then the Principal places the proposals in the departmental committee and subject to its approval further places it in the finance committee which allocates the required funds. The process of procurement then starts. The available resources are then optimally used according to need based priority.

#### 4.4.2 <u>Institutional Mechanisms for Maintenance and Upkeep of the Infrastructure</u> <u>Facilities and Equipment of the College</u>

For routine maintenance of the civil structures of the college, management of college has engaged a civil engineer. The contractors are engaged for a particular work on the basis of lowest quotation along with their reputation. The work is supervised by part – time civil engineer. For new construction external architects are hired. According to his / her directions the civil constractors perform the job.

The college has workmen who are engaged round the year in either manufacturing or repairing of furniture, fitting, facility system like electrical and water supply network. The generators are regularly maintained for continuous supply of electricity. Sweeper is engaged to clean all the toilets.

For the maintenance of computer system related gadgets and network facility, the college has Annual Maintenance Contract with private service provider.

#### 4.4.3 Frequency of calibration and other Precision Measures for the Equipments/ Instruments of Institution.

The college has work agreements with the local service providers and AMC with companies to service, calibrate and repair the several types of measuring equipment in the different labs.



WBSEDCL has installed one separate transformer of 1.5 KV for the college campus to cope up with increasing electrical load.

#### 4.4.4 Major steps taken for Location, Upkeep and maintenance of Sensitive Equipments

The college has its own transformer and two generators that ensure uninterrupted supply of electricity.

The college has a branch of Syndicate Bank within the college campus.

For constant supply of water, good numbers of overhead tanks and distribution networks have been provided throughout the campus.

The college provides purified and safe drinking water all over the campus and hostel.

The college has full time electrical, plumbing technicians and pump operators who keep vigil over all the electrical and water supply systems.

Regular and stabilized electricity supply is maintained with the help of voltage stabilizer for the smooth functioning of the laboratories and its instruments.

This institution always plans ahead to ensure that the infrastructure development keeps pace with its academic growth and that the available infrastructure is optimally used. Additions are made and existing ones are repaired wherever need arises.

- 24 x 7 security deployment for supervision
- All laboratories and sensitive areas are equipped with fire extinguisher.

#### 5.1 Student Mentoring and Support

#### 5.1.1 Prospectus

The institution publishes its updated prospectus annually, before the start of admission process. The Prospectus contains general information about the college and particulars of Under Graduate Courses. [Students of Urdu (PG) course are selected through central counselling conducted by The University of Burdwan]. The prospectus is given to applicants along with the application forms at the time of admission. It aims to acquaint the students with the curricular, co-curricular, extracurricular and administrative features of the college. The following information is contained in the prospectus:

- Courses offered and subjects taught

- Infrastructure facilities like libraries and Boys Hostel.
- Reservation for SC/ST/OBC/Physically Handicapped students
- Information regarding NCC and NSS
- Information regarding students' union.

#### Commitment

T.D.B College, with its holistic approach, is committed to provide Higher Education to the students residing in the coalfield and rural areas around Raniganj to enable them to establish themselves in society. A wide range of courses are offered to students by the college. Facilities like free-ships are provided to poor and talented students. In addition to providing curricular and Co-Curricular programmes students are intimated about future career options through seminars conducted by the Career and Counselling Cell of the College. A 10-day long employability programme organised by Tata Consultancy Services together with the NSS unit of the College was appreciated by the students. Six students were selected for jobs in TCS. More grooming sessions are planned to enable the students to compete successfully in interviews for jobs. The College has taken care of its social responsibility through its NSS unit. The unit has adopted two wards of Asansol-Municipal Corporation. The NSS and NCC units also conduct Blood donation and health check up camps. Thus the College tries to fulfil its commitment to produce students who are academically strong and sound, morally upright, socially aware and responsible citizens of India.

The Institution is aware of its responsibility and accountability towards its stakeholders. Feedbacks are collected from III (Third) year students of the



college just before their final examinations. They are given one questionnaire and asked to rate the various infrastructural facilities provided by the College and another to rate the faculty members in respect of various aspects of teaching and learning. The data so collected are analysed to identify areas that need improvement. Appropriate action is then taken.

## 5.1.2 Type, number and amount of institutional scholarships/ free-ships given to the students during the last four years and timeliness of their disbursement.

Financial aid is available in the following forms:

- **Govt Scholarships:** Stipends for SC/ST students and National scholarships for the meritorious students are sanctioned by State Govt. and Central Govt. through the college.
- **Student Aid Fund:** This fund helps the poor meritorious students to submit their university examination fees.
- Free Studentship: Full or half free concession is granted to poor and meritorious students as per Govt. rules.
- The college has a Stipend Committee comprising a teacher as convener, the welfare secretary of students union, 6 other teachers and two non-teaching staffs who conduct counselling session for selection of free studentship from first year students of science, arts and commerce.
- Assistance to poor but meritorious students from Students aid fund of the college.
- The Alumni association of the college provides the educational expenses of ten students on a merit-cum-means basis.

All financial aid is available and disbursed in time as per requirement.

#### e) Medical assistance to Students: Health Centre, Health Insurance, etc.:

The medical unit of the college is situated near the main gate. General physician visits the unit on a temporary basis on call. The unit has first aid



facilities. Students can consult the doctor free of cost. In case of emergencies the doctor is called and action taken on the basis of advice given by him.

#### f) Organising Coaching Classes for Competitive Exams.

There are no formal coaching classes for competitive examinations. However, students preparing for JAM are helped by teachers of several science departments.

#### g) Skill Development (Spoken English, Computer Literacy, etc):

TATA Consultancy Services together with NSS unit of the college held a 10 day employability training programme in the college in February 2015. The number of participants was 182, of whom 6 were offered jobs in the TCS. The Career and Counselling cell of the college plans to hold grooming sessions for third year students shortly.

There is a unit run by The Institute of Computer Engineers (India) under NIELIT in the college premises. Students of the college can enrol themselves in their courses to become trained computer professionals.

### h) Exposures of Students to other Institutions for higher learning/ corporate/ business house etc.:

The department of history organised an exchange programme with the history department of Raniganj Girls College.

#### i) Support for "slow learners"

Slow learners are given extra attention by teachers outside class hours

#### j) Publication of Student Magazines:

Wall magazines are put up by different departments. The students of these departments get an opportunity to express their talent in writing and painting. Often these wall magazines are based on themes which are socially relevant. The boys' hostel also has its own wall magazine. The department of zoology has published a magazine called 'Chrysalis'.

### 5.1.5 Efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills and impact of efforts.

The college has a Mulberry Garden where the study of Sericulture was promoted but has been temporarily discontinued due to lack of students.

## 5.1.6 Policies and strategies of the institution which promote participation of students in Extracurricular and Co-curricular Activities.

Students are encouraged to participate in extracurricular activities as volunteers of NSS and cadets of NCC. They are engaged in various social welfare activities throughout the year like participation in cleanliness activity, plantation of trees in college campus, environmental awareness



programme, human rights awareness programme, blood donation camp, etc. Students play football, cricket and volleyball in the college playgrounds. The annual sports are held for two days in winter, every year. Singing, dancing, recitation, painting, short story writing, quiz and other competitions and debates are held on an annual basis. Prizes are distributed on the last day of the annual social function of the college. A variety of cultural programmes is held during the annual social. Apart from this, the college also bears the conveyance to players for participation to different venues.

College celebrates Independence Day, Republic day, Birth day of Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose on 23<sup>rd</sup> January, College foundation day on 9<sup>th</sup> August and Language day on 21<sup>st</sup> February with the co-operation of NCC, NSS and students' union.

## **5.1.7** Support and guidance provided to the students in preparing for the Competitive Examinations.

Although there is no system of coaching to the students in preparing for competitive examinations. However, the career and counselling cell organises some seminar on career option of students of different stream. Many have appeared and qualified in various competitive examinations and most of them are successfully and efficiently working in India and abroad. A large number of students have qualified in School Service Commission examination. Many other students have cleared NET/SET. Prakash Kumar Das, Mrinal Kanti Mandal and Ganesh Rajak, ex-students of the college, qualified in NET/SET and are at present faculty members in the mathematics and physics departments, respectively, of this college. Many students have also qualified in WBCS examination and are employed by the state government. Numerous students have also cleared Banking examination and are placed in various Nationalised Banks. Many students of commerce are successful chartered accountant.

### 5.1.8. Counselling services made Available to the students.

The Career and Counselling Cell arranges academic and career oriented counselling departmentally. Periodical career counselling sessions have been conducted, where trained and qualified counsellors were invited as resource persons.

## 5.1.9. Structural Mechanism for Career Guidance and Placement of Students:

The College started a UGC Sponsored Career Counselling Cell on 20.09.2010. Several seminars conducted by this cell are:

• Sri Kaulik Ghosh a journalist who writes articles on career related matters in "Ananda-Bazar Patrika" and his team of experts gave seminars on Careerrelated issues and also organized a grooming session for students. Smt Parijat Bandyopadhyay, a free-lance journalist spoke of career opportunities in journalism.





- Mr. Kausik Auddy, Manager, Human Resources, Hinduja Global Solutions, organised an orientation programme for job recruitment.
- 'Jetking', computer hardware and networking institution, conducted seminar to invite students to attend one-day workshops organized by 'Jetking Information LTD' at Kolkata.
- Career and counselling seminars in the departments of Geography, Geology, Political Science, Philosophy, Mathematics, Electronics, Physics, Botany, Zoology, and Physiology.
- Career prospects in govt services through examinations conducted by the Union Public Service Commission (UPSC) – a seminar was delivered by Sushanta Bhattacharjee, (IAS) on 25<sup>th</sup> September 2014.

### 5.1.10. Student Grievance Redressal Cell

The institution has a women's grievance cell and an anti-ragging cell whose conveners are full-time faculty members.

### 5.3.3 Feedback Mechanism

The College has a centralized mechanism to collect feedback from its thirdyear students before their final examinations with a view to improve the growth and development of the College. Students are given feedback forms where they are expected to give opinions about their teachers in respect of various teaching aspects. They are also given a separate form where they are asked to rank different infrastructural facilities of the college like library, canteen, drinking water facility etc. The information so collected are analyzed by IQAC in consultation with the Principal to identify the problems that need attention. Necessary steps are then taken.

Various academic themes and contemporary issues are covered by these magazines. These magazines are mainly prepared by the students, sometimes with guidance from teachers. In this way, students get an opportunity to showcase their talents. The Boys' hostel also has its own wall magazine.

### 5.3.5 Students' Council

The College has its Students' Union which is the representative body of all its students. The students' representatives are directly elected every year by bona-fide students of the college in accordance with the provisions in the statutes of the affiliating University by means of secret ballots. The Principal/ Teacher-in-charge of the college is the president of the students' union. The union has seven departments - cultural, welfare society, games, magazines, vigyan (science), boy's common room and girl's common room. Each department has a teacher as vice president, who guides the activities of the students.

The General Secretary and other office bearers of the students' union are elected from among the newly elected class representatives. The General Secretary of students' union communicates the problems of students to the college authorities. By virtue of his post he is a member of the Governing Body of the college, where he represents the student community of the college.

The Students' Union organises a delightful annual cultural programme "Utsab", newly named "Mrittika" and carries out many recreational activities like students' fresher's welcome programme "Nabin Baran", annual sports,



Teachers' Day Celebration, Saraswati Puja and cultural competitions in the college.

Students' union takes an active role in the process of awarding of student free-ships from the student aid fund of the college.

All the above mentioned activities are funded by the college. The required fund is collected at the time of students' admission under the head of 'Union Fees'.

All activities of the student union are based on the following aims and objects:

- a) Maintenance of unity among students and cordial relation with teachers and non teaching staff.
- b) Promotion of discipline, sense of responsibility, integration and brotherhood among the students.
- c) Promotion of academic, scientific, cultural, and social interest among students
- d) Providing of financial aid to needy and poor students.

## 5.3.6 Academic and Administrative bodies having Student Representatives

The General Secretary of the democratically elected students union represents the student community in the Governing body, which is the highest decision making administrative body of the college. Apart from G. B. the General Secretary is also a member of different committees like sports, Canteen, career counselling cell etc.

## **5.3.7** Networking and collaboration with the Alumni and Former Faculty of the Institution

TDB College Alumni Association is a registered body of former students. It is a bridge between former and current students of this college. The Alumni of the college are well disposed towards their alma-matter and they are eager to further its development. The college authorities welcome any assistance from the alumni association for the benefit of the present students.

The former faculty of the college exchange and share their views, knowledge, experience with the existing faculty members and give valuable suggestions regarding the further development of the departments of the college. Former teachers of this college are sometimes invited to give talks to students. On 12<sup>th</sup> January, 2013 the NSS unit of this college invited Prof. Dulal Chandra Singha Roy to deliver a lecture on "Swami Vivekananda".

The various departments frame the policies to complete the recommended syllabus by the respective Board of Studies of the University in proper time.

## 6.1.5 Details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management:

Representative of the faculties take part in the management.

- The faculty plays a leading role in admission, conducting examinations, and extra-curricular activities.
- Different committees have been formed with specific assignment with the inclusion of teaching and non-teaching staff in it.
- These committees execute the assigned job for the academic, administrative and student welfare activities.
- Three faculty, two non-teaching staff and the G.S. of students form part of the Governing Body of the college that actively help the college in its administration.

• College has adopted on-line admission process from the session 2015-16.



- Continuous evaluation of the academic routine of the teachers.

- College office is partly computerized.
- All Science, Commerce departments along with the Urdu PG department are computerized.
- Central Library of the college is computerized and coding system is going to be completed.
- The college observes Independence Day, Republic Day, Teachers' Day, Language day every year and in this respect NCC & NSS conducts various programmes to impart high morale to the students.
- Students' Union celebrates the Fresher's Welcome for the newly admitted students and also arranges a Grand Social function & Annual Sports meet.

## 6.1.7 Delegation of authority and providing operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system:

The college delegates authority and provides operational autonomy to the departments and ensures decentralized governance system in the following way:

- Management encouragement in this respect is possible because there exists a cordial relationship among students, teaching and non -teaching staff. Neighboring people also extend help to improve the effectiveness of the academic atmosphere of the college.

## 6.2.11 Mechanism of the Institution for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance and the outcome and response of the institution to this:

The student feedback is properly analyzed and reviewed, the shortcomings are identified and corrective measures are taken to prevent the recurrence of the same in future.

### 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

### 6.3.1 Efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non -teaching staff:

The teachers are encouraged to attend different seminars, conferences, symposium as mere participants to gather knowledge or as resource persons. Faculties are also encouraged to attend orientation courses, refresher courses conducted by the UGC for academic upliftment. The college has been providing good Laboratory facility for the setting up good infrastructure and this will make room for positive motivation of the teachers. The teachers are also



encouraged to conduct minor and major research programmes. When required, teachers have been granted study leave for ongoing PhD research / Post Doctoral Research. College also grants leave under FIP to carry out Ph. D degree.

- The departments are also encouraged to organize seminars. The teachers of various departments participate in the seminars. Non-teaching staff also take part in educating themselves about the latest development in the society.
- Non-teaching staff upgrade themselves through regular interaction with the Head Clerk, accountant and the Principal/TIC. They also get in touch with their Governing Body representative to learn about the decisions taken in the Governing Body.

# 6.3.2 Strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform:

The faculty are encouraged to attend the seminars and conferences, they are also encouraged to attend Orientation programmes and Refresher courses conducted by the UGC for their academic up-gradation.

- Some infrastructure is provided to the teachers for carrying out research work, minor and major projects.
- Programme Officers of NSS are encouraged to attend the orientation programme conducted by the affiliated universities.
- Motivational classes are also arranged by the NSS.
- Seminars are organized by the departments for the interaction among teachers of various institutions and this paves the way for growth in knowledge.

## 6.3.3 Details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal:

- Performance appraisal system of the staff specially for the teachers is in vogue. It is initiated through student feedback at the time of sent-up test of the outgoing students.
- Few faculties also try to get feedback from their student in the classroom.
- The evaluation is properly assessed and measures are taken, if need be, to improve teaching -learning process, in order to build up ideal academic atmosphere.



## 6.3.4 Outcome of review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken and the process of communication to the appropriate stakeholders:

The grass root level information is periodically received. Different committees discuss and make some recommendation for the vertical improvement of academic atmosphere.

Teachers' Council and the Academic Committee often meet together to discuss academic matters of the students and the outcome is conveyed either by the departmental teachers or by giving notice to the students.

# 6.3.5 Welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff and the percentage of staff who have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years:

Various forms of welfare schemes are available both for the teaching and non-teaching staff.

- General provident fund for the permanent staff.
- Co-operative credit society for the permanent staff.
- Advances for Puja & Id festival are given not only to the permanent staff but also to the contractual and part-time staff.
- Medical unit has been running successfully in the college. One Medical officer visits once a week for providing medical check-up. The staff are very eager to run the aforementioned schemes which ultimately make them loyal to the institute.

## 6.3.6 Measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty:

- Different departments of the college often invite eminent scholars to deliver lectures at seminars.
- The college, however, has not yet developed the advanced infrastructure for research to attract eminent teachers as faculty members.
- The college does not have the autonomy to directly recruit faculty members.

### 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

### 6.4.1 The institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources:

The college adopts different mechanisms to monitor the effective and efficient use of financial resources. The utilization of financial resources is being monitored by the Accountant and the Bursar with prior authentication and authorization of the Finance Committee. Each purchase is allowed after inviting proper quotation. In some cases, departmental autonomy is given for purchase of items of meager amount.



## 6.4.2 The institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit, last audit done and the major audit objections with details:

The college accounts are audited regularly. So far as internal audit is concerned, a team consisting of Accountant, Bursar, members of Finance Committee, and Principal/TIC supervises the preparation of accounts with the help of a Private Chartered farm. This system of maintaining accounts paves the way for error free accounts and it becomes easier for the external auditor to conduct college audit very smoothly.

The last audit was conducted for the financial year 2013-14.(The audit for the financial year 2014-15 is in process and is expected to be completed by March ,

2016.) the auditors' report is as follows:

#### Report on the Financial Statements

Chartered Accountants

We have audited the annexed financial statements of TRIVENI DEVI BHALOTIA

**COLLEGE,** Raniganj 713347, District Burdwan which comprise of the Balance Sheet as at 31<sup>et</sup> March 2014, the Income & Expenditure Account and the Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date and a summary of the significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

#### Management's responsibility for the financial statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of these financial statements that give a true and fair view of the financial position and financial performance of the entity. These responsibilities include the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and presentation of the financial statements that give a true and fair view and are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

#### > Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We have conducted our audit in accordance with the Standards on Auditing issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the unit's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of the accounting policies used and the reasonableness of the accounting estimates made by the management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statement.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.





> Opinion

Based on our audit our observations are given in the paragraphs below:

1) The Salary paid during 2013-14 has not been stated in the Income & Expenditure Account on Mercantile Basis and has been presented on Cash Basis. Salary for March 2013 paid in 2013-14 amounting to Rs 42,97,360 and Salary for March 2014 paid in 2014-15 amounting to Rs 44,64,092 has not been adjusted as is required under the mercantile system of accounting. *This has resulted in understatement of expenses and deficit by Rs* 1,66,732.

2) Grant in aid received during 2013-14 has not been stated in the Income & Expenditure Account on Mercantile Basis and has been presented on Cash Basis. Grant in Aid for 2012-13 received in 2013-14 amounting to Rs 9,30,900 has not been adjusted as is required under the mercantile system of accounting. *This has resulted in overstatement of Grant in Aid and understatement of deficit by Rs 9,30,900*.

3) Schedule of Current Liabilities reflect an amount of Rs. 82,91,741 under the head of Asansol Treasury. No explanation has been given by the College explaining why such figure is appearing as liability and whether such amount is refundable to Asansol Treasury. In the absence of necessary explanations in this regard, we disclaim to offer any opinion on the correctness or existence of such liability appearing under the head Asansol Treasury.

4) The written down value (wdv) of Fixed Assets states a figure of Rs 81,72,529=78 being Cost of Assets (Rs 3,67,39,529=57) less accumulated depreciation (Rs. 2,85,66,999=79) as on 31/03/2014. Written down value of individual assets were not arrived at and consequently were not available for audit. Such bundling of assets into a single block of asset does not reflect the true position of the Fixed Assets of the college. In the absence of the required information with regard to the classification fixed assets as per the individual wdv we disclaim to offer any opinion on the existence, location, value, and quality or impairment status of any of the fixed assets mentioned therein.

5) Depreciation on fixed assets has been charged at the flat rate of 10% on the cost of the assets irrespective of the years in use. Since the assets are being carried in a bundle any anomaly remains under cover. In the light of the above we disclaim to offer any opinion on the adequacy or inadequacy of the quantum of depreciation charged during the year or its effect on the Deficit stated for the year.

6) The Provident Fund statement does not reflect the true value of the transaction vis-à-vis the Receipts & Payments Account. The difference is being given below:

We have not received any satisfactory clarification explaining such anomalies. The statement of Provident Fund however is in agreement with the confirmation received from the Treasury and as such it appears to be wrong incorporation of figures in the books of accounts of the college.

7) Schedule of Current Assets include debit balances which have no value as on date and is nothing but expenditure already incurred or services already received appearing in the garb of Current Assets in the balance sheet. No future benefit will accrue to the college from out of such advances. The details of such expenditures as appearing in the Schedule of Current Assets are given below:

Thus the erroneous presentation of past expenditures as Current Assets and non-incorporation of expenditures has resulted in understatement of deficit and overstatement of Current Assets by Rs. 13,78,922=45.

8) Loans & Advances to Staff of Rs 72,674=88=88 includes prior year balances of Rs 18,589=88 which are not recoverable as on date and needs to be written off. No recovery is observed during the year in these accounts. This has resulted in understatement of deficit and overstatement of Advance to Staff by Rs 18,589=88.

9) Advances from Sub Funds:










## 6.4.4 Details of the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

### 6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

## a. Establishment of an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and its contribution in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes:

The institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) for academic excellence on 24.02.2014 through a resolution of the Governing Body. This cell has an office on the ground floor of the main building. It is activity engaged in smooth running of academic affairs and give suggestions for infrastructural improvement, resource mobilization, giving emphasis on quality rather than quantity.

IQAC sits and monitors the overall performances and also reviews the entire scenario of the institution. Setting up the IQAC made every staff member of the college cautious and conscious. Each and every member of the staff is aware of his or her responsibility and works accordingly.

### **b.** Decisions of the IQAC approved by the management/ authorities for implementation and number actually implemented

The Governing Body approves of most of the recommendations of IQAC to improve infrastructure and facilities of the college.

### c. External members in IQAC and significant contributions made by them.

The IQAC has two external members in its committee.

### d. Contribution of students and alumni to the effective functioning of the IQAC

The ultimate effect of setting up the IQAC is the promotion of good academic atmosphere and to make an impact in the society.



As per the recommendation of the IQAC, every effort is initiated to improve classroom teaching, interaction with the students, getting feedback, reviewing the results, organizing seminars, group discussion, debates and thereby enriching the quality of education. Students often send their suggestion to IQAC through their feedback.

## e. Communication and engagement of staff from different constituents of the institution by IQAC

IQAC makes a positive communication to make an impact of qualitative improvement of academic atmosphere. This is ensured because all the departments make a wholehearted effort to cooperate to make it a successful IQAC.

### 6.5.2 Integrated framework of the institution for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities and its operationalisation:

The institution has an intergraded frame work for quality assurance of academic and administrative activities.

Departments often make some new recommendations to be put forward to the Principal through the IQAC. IQAC analyses, reviews and approves those recommendations and places them for approval of the governing body through the principal.

## 6.5.3 Provision of training to the staff of the institution for effective implementation of the quality assurance procedures and its impact

The institute conducted several programmes for largely informal training to its staff for effective implementation of the quality assurance procedure.

- The college installed its LAN and server system in the college recently. For maintenance and smooth running of the system formal training is provided to the staffs and teachers of Computer Science Department. The training has been provided by the Service Provider.
- Informal training is provided to the laboratory attendants of various departments for maintenance and smooth running of the laboratories. The training is given by the teachers.
- Informal training is given by the Librarians to the support staffs for library functioning.
- Informal training has been given to the staff for Generator maintenance.

## 6.5.4 Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions undertaken by the institution:

Academic audit is yet to be sought. Discussion is going on regarding this audit. But, the institution is always reviewing the academic results and constructive suggestions to improve the academic results is highly appreciated.



## 6.5.5 Alignment of the internal quality assurance mechanisms with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities:

The suggestion and recommendation of IQAC, have been sent to the Governing Body for its approval. The College Authorities are trying to strike a balance between the recommendations of IQAC and the resources of the college. Till now no consultation has taken place with any EQAA for quality assurance.

## 6.5.6 Institutional mechanisms in place to continuously review the teaching learning process. Details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome.

Academic atmosphere is always monitored and upgraded. It is monitored through different institutional mechanisms like class test, debate, group discussion etc.

The results are discussed in the IQAC, and suggestions and recommendation are sent to the concerned departments for follow-up action. Often intradepartmental meeting is convened to review and make an action plan for future qualitative improvement of teaching-learning process.

### **CRITERION – VII: INNOVATION AND BEST PRACTICES**





#### 7.1 Environment Consciousness

Trivenidevi Bhalotia College (TDB College), situated on the northern bank of the river Damodar, in Raniganj town of Burdwan district of West Bengal. Raniganj is a premier town in this coal field area, maintaining its tradition as a patron of education and culture. TDB college has become the focal point of such patronage and service to the down trodden yet aspiring people of this coal field region as an educational hub over a long span of 58 years. Though Raniganj and its catchment area is dry and arid, our campus stands unique with its lush green expanse, gigantic trees, shrubs, herbal plants, colorful ornamental plants, chirping birds, rich biodiversity and overall serene environment.

A special mention may be made of the following features of the vast campus of this college:

- Play grounds with permanent gallery
- Separate library building with open access system
- Open air stage
- Boys' hostel
- Large numbers of staff quarters
- Garden of medicinal plants
- A rich biodiversity
- Medical room
- Branch of a public sector Bank
- Subsidized Canteen

The institution has been inculcating the ethos of eco-friendliness through preservation of its natural environment. It is concerned with the quality achieved through innovation and best practices.

### 7.1.1 Institutional Green Audit of its Campus and Facilities

The institution shows its consciousness and responsibility towards the maintenance and management of the environment, and with this attitude it conducts a green audit of its campus and facilities.

The green audit is carried out by the institution through maintenance of the following activities:

- Campaign among the students and staff.
- Consumption of electricity and necessary arrangement for its rational reduction
- Use of solar energy in the campus.
- Implementation of eco –friendly practices
- Information is collected from users through feedback mechanism.
- Practices in curriculum through awareness programme and environmental studies
- A survey of the campus revealed the following environmental issues:
- Approximately 36 % of the college campus is open space.



- There are 122 trees representing 26 species in the college campus
- There are 58 shrubs and 40 herbs.
  - There are no water logged areas.

The open space of the campus helps the rain water to percolate into the soil layer.

#### 7.1.2 Initiative taken by the college to ensure that the campus is eco- friendly

a) Energy *conservation:* The college is fast switching over to the use of modern low energy consumption resources to minimize electricity consumption. Existing energy consuming tube lights, sodium lamps and mercury lamps have been replaced with energy saving tubes, CFLs, and fans with lower power consumption. Star rated electric appliances like AC, refrigerators etc. are used to save energy. Kirlosker green generator is used as noise-free standard frequency energy source for a green environment. Energy consumption in the boy's hostel is closely monitored by turning off lights during day time.

**b) Use of Renewable Energy:** A number of solar panels will be installed in the boys' hostel.

c) Water Harvesting: Water harvesting is yet to be done.

d) Check Dam Construction: No such dam has been constructed yet.

e) Efforts for carbon Neutrality: Care has been taken to restrict vehicle entry into the campus except the cars owned by the faculty members. Residents of the campus mostly use LPG for cooking purposes. Use of coal as a fuel is discouraged.

The institution has installed two low carbon emitting Kirloskar generators to provide clean power back-up in its campus to maintain uninterrupted power supply during power cuts, keeping the pollution level a minimum. Uprooting or felling of any trees in the college campus has been strictly prohibited with a view to maintain the gaseous balance of the environment and make it healthy. Awareness programmes such as 'Briksha Ropon'(plantation of trees) are conducted by the NSS unit of the college.

The combustion of the dry leaves and any other vegetable debris are strictly prohibited in the campus with an aim towards reduction of carbon dioxide emission.

**f)** *Plantation/ Greening and cleaning devices:* The college has started to take measures with a view to make the campus green and clean. Trees have been planted by students along both sides of the approach way and other parts of the campus.

The NSS unit of the college actively organizes green campaigns from time to time and motivates the freshers to join their team. The volunteers of the NSS unit have



also taken commendable initiatives by arranging seminars to make students and residents outside the college campus aware about the dangers and control measures for eradication of malaria, dengue and chickungunya, and other mosquito vector borne diseases. Some seminars are also organized to grow awareness about thalassaemia, a dreaded genetic disease as well as HIV/AIDS.

The college maintains two gardens in its campus, endearingly christened 'Rabindra Bithi, a marvelous garden of ornamental flowering plants and 'Charaka Sushruta Udyan', a herbal garden rich in medicinal plant species. Each plant in the medicinal garden bears plaques/tags inscribed with its common as well as scientific names to make students, especially those of Botany, and also others, aware about the importance of scientific nomenclature and its medicinal uses/values.

The members of NSS unit often take initiatives to clean the campus of plastics and Parthenium.

Hazardous and toxic chemicals from the Chemistry Laboratories are disposed and highly diluted in closed containers so that these do not have any harmful effect on the environment of the campus.

The institution under the canopy of the faculty of the biological sciences has established 'Vasundhara Club' and 'Bird watcher club' to study natural bio diversity, in both flora and fauna.

An encouraging number of enthusiastic students have taken free membership of these clubs to make other student conscious about the importance of rich biodiversity in the campus. Moreover these members have developed a photo gallery of their programmes.

g) Hazardous waste management and e-waste management: The college has a desirable acreage of land which enables the disposal of waste materials without harming the local residents. e-Waste is disposed in a specific junk room. Students are made continuously aware about the necessity of effective waste management through class teachings on Environmental Studies (ENVS). Liquid wastes generated in the campus flow out through proper drainage system, which is non-polluting and non-contaminating to the environment.

**h)** Controlling visual Pollutions: Our College has taken stern disciplinary action against visual pollution and controls commendably any form of graffiti on its inner walls. The students also cooperate to check such visual pollution in the campus. The pertinent order/ circular in this regard, endorsed by the highest authority of the college are displayed on the designated places is strictly adhered to.

### 7.2. Innovations

The college has introduced a series of innovative options to respond to the needs of its students and other stakeholders.



# 7.2.1. Details of innovations introduced during the last four years which created a positive impact on the functioning of the College.

# **Innovation in curriculum design:**

- Seminar is organized by some departments to develop presentation skills of the students.
- Sense of social responsibility inculcated through NCC, NSS.
- Following up of academic calendar with teaching plan/ curriculum design which have been utilized by the college.
- Continuous evaluation system in the form of class test, module test, and sent up test.

# **Innovations in teaching learning:**

- Wide circulation and transparency in admission process through online admission in UG Courses along with total computerization.
- A blended mode of conventional black/green/white board teaching and LCD projector based teaching is in operation.
- Traditional lecture method is supplemented with the seminar method of teaching where the students are the speakers of the seminars.
- Inculcation of scientific temper among the students.
- Provisions of online journals through INFLIBNET N List for faculty and the students (under process).
- Making provision of language laboratory with modern software for the students (under process).

# **Innovative instructional method:**

- Experimental learning (learning by doing)
- Presentation of papers by the students in seminars.
- Participation in mock parliament.
- Participation of students in debates on contemporary issues in annual cultural competitions of the college.
- Participation of students of different departments in exhibition organized by the college during annual cultural function.
- Participation of the students in field work, excursion / educational tours.

# **Innovative techniques in assessment:**

- Aptitude of the students in presenting papers in class seminars.
- Through group discussions and peer group learning.



#### **Inclusiveness and Diversity:**

The college addresses and resolves the problems of differently abled students and other diverse groups through the following cells:

- Women's grievance cell
- Minority cell
- Anti ragging cell

#### **Innovations in Infrastructural Planning:**

The college provides the following innovative infrastructural planning to its stakeholders:

- Providing a number of departments with LCD Projectors to use as a smart teaching aid.
- Developing a modern central library with internet (WiFi facility).
- Providing open access in the central library.
- Facility of a Doctor's chamber in the campus as an aid to health care of students and staff.
- Facility of a football ground with spectator's gallery.
- Facility of an open air stage.
- Facility of a boys' hostel with capacity of accommodation of about hundred boys.
- Planning to establish a girls' hostel in the campus.
- Facility of a separate server room.
- Availability of guest rooms for teachers with desired facilities within the campus, along with lunch facilities in a common dining room.
- Providing cold purified drinking water for students in summer.

### **Innovative Higher Focus Course:**

The college conducts the following 'Higher Focus Course' along with the regular academic courses for better development of various skills of the students.

- A centre of AICTE and NIELIT has been set up to offer some advanced professional courses to the aspirant students.
- Planning by the career counseling cell is in progress to conduct a grooming session by experts with a view to prepare students to face job interviews smartly.
- Implementation of NCC programme through the participation of the students under the guidance of NCC officer of the college in collaboration with 48 Bengal Battalion.



#### Innovative to be socially responsible:

The college observes its social responsibilities through the NSS, NCC schemes and Physiology department. The following programmes of social awareness are organized:

- Organizing awareness programmes about AIDS / HIV, malaria, dengue etc.
- Organizing awareness programmes on human rights.
- Organizing blood donation camps.

Each third year student is given separate feedback forms regarding teaching and learning aspects of their departments, and infrastructural facilities provided by the college, before the final examinations. After receiving the filled up feedback forms, IQAC analyses the data obtained. The strengths and weaknesses of the departments are recorded. Also, the suggestions from the students are noted. Accordingly, the college authorities take necessary measures for required quality enhancement. Thus students' feedback system has emerged as a very dynamic technique to facilitate the all round development of the college.

#### 7.3. Best Practices

# 7.3.1 Conservation of Health and Hygiene by the Way of Greenery and Cleanliness:

#### **Objectives of the practice:**

- To make the campus clean and green: To make the college environment more eco-friendly and peaceful.
- To develop good habits: Many students have bad habits like spitting, littering etc. that spoil the ambience of the campus. By growing good habits among students such nuisance can be checked.
- Making the campus a non-plastic and tobacco free zone: To reduce the nonbiodegradable and carcinogenic materials within the campus, students are discouraged to use such materials.
- To identify the areas for further improvement: Development is a continuous process. So there is always scope for improvement.
- To take up eco-friendly measures to keep the campus clean: To develop habit among the students to segregate the biodegradable and non-biodegradable wastes by using separate bins.
- To inculcate green habits among the students: Students are the future citizens of the country. So it will be their responsibility to maintain a pollution free environment wherever they go.
- To vaccinate the stray dogs loitering in the campus as a preventive measure towards deadly diseases.



# The Context:

- The students, in their teenage, are more vulnerable to tobacco addiction. The students of this college are no exception. It is a challenge for the college to make them aware of the health hazards of tobacco consumption.
- Spitting and littering is another problem in the college campus. So, initiatives have been taken by the college authorities in the form of motivating seminars and installation of banners barring such practices.
- There are a large number of stray dogs in the campus. Following the animal ethics guidelines the college has not been cruel enough to call dog catchers for their elimination.
- During late winter and rainy season weed like Parthenium (*Parthenium histerophorus*) grows luxuriantly disseminating its pollen grains which are severe allergens causing acute and chronic respiratory diseases. It is a challenge for college authorities to keep the campus free of such plants causing this serious health hazard.
- Since the college is located in the Raniganj coalfields, the environment is infested by coal dust, fly ash, and a number suspended particulate matter (SPM) which poses a threat of different air borne, respiratory, and nososcomial infections.

# The Practice:

To make the campus eco-friendly the following initiatives have been taken:

- A compost pit has been dug in one corner of the garden of medicinal plants in which vegetable and fruit peels, dry and fallen leaves, uprooted weeds etc. are thrown. These vegetative debris are converted into organic manure over time and can be used instead of chemical fertilizers in the college gardens. In this way burning of dry leaves which generates polluting smoke is prevented.
- Plantation of trees is carried out on a regular basis to make the campus green, cool and habitable.
- Installation of solar panels in the boys' hostel is intended to provide clean fuel for heating water as well as power back up during power cuts.
- Lecture sessions on eco-feminism and sustainable development had been arranged for the students involved in the NSS programme. Eco-feminism is basically a philosophical/political theory which combines ecological concerns with feminist ones.

To cope with the different problems the college authority has taken the following steps:

- To increase the awareness against tobacco consumption among the students the college authority has conducted seminars and installed anti-smoking banners in the common spaces of the college campus. The authority has also planned to implement a nominal fine for such nuisances.
- The college authority has installed separate bins for biodegradable and nonbiodegradable solid wastes. The bins are placed at common places as well as in the different departments. The college authorities also take proper initiative for the proper disposal of those waste materials collected in separate bins. In some



specific spaces bins filled with sand have been placed as measure to check spitting at different nook and corners of the college. Banners stressing on the importance of cleanliness have also been installed.

- The college proposes to vaccinate the dogs in the near future to prevent different zoonotic diseases.
- Labourers are regularly engaged to uproot weeds from the college campus. Students of the NSS units are also actively engaged in removal of Parthenium .
- Plans are afoot to construct concrete roads in the college campus to cover the exposed soil surface and thus reduce dust. College grounds are sprayed with water to reduce the concentration of flying dust.

### **Evidence of Success:**

- Categorised dustbins have been installed at various places within the campus to collect biodegradable and non-biodegradable solid wastes separately. This has considerably reduced the littering in the campus.
- Putting up of placards in various places of the campus forbidding spitting has controlled this menace considerably. It is also expected that, the students of this college will discourage this bad practice outside the college campus.
- Such initiatives by the college authorities have developed a sense of aversion towards tobacco products like *Gutkha, Pan Masala* etc. among the students.
- 26 new trees have been planted in the college campus by the NSS unit to maintain the greenery in the current year. This is a regular process in this college, which increases the green cover in the campus. And the students also take great care to nurture and preserve those saplings planted.
- Unwanted weeds and Parthenium plants are almost eliminated from the college campus. That ensures a clean and healthy environment in the campus both for students and residents.
- The dustbins installed in the campus are emptied out regularly, which is an evidence of maintenance of cleanliness in the campus.

### Problems encountered and resources required:

- There is a paucity of funds for the implementation of various programmes, like installation of enough solar panels, construction of metalled roads in the campus etc.
- More toilets need to be constructed at different locations in the campus, like students' canteen and common rooms. The number of janitors employed needs to be increased in order to maintain clean toilets.
- More efforts are required to wean away a larger number of students from tobacco products.
- A considerable number of students and staff of the college are still ignoring the steps being taken to make the college a "Tobacco Free Zone".
- Though every year new saplings are planted in the campus, a few do not survive. Therefore more efforts are needed to ensure 100% survival of those plants.



In the rainy season enough labour is not available for cleaning the overgrowth in the campus. As a result of that, snakes pose a threat to the residents during that time.

# 7.3.2 Promotion of sports and cultural activities among students

### **Objectives of the practice:**

- Along with the intellectual development, the proper growth of the mental, physical, emotional and cultural aspects of man are also necessary for moulding him into a good citizen. To encourage all-round development of the students., various sports and cultural activities are promoted.
- Participation in games and sports and cultural activities encourages physical development and inculcates a sense of civic responsibility and community orientation.
- Encourages cultivating some divine aspects of our life—humanity and brotherhood.
- Discourages wasting of time and energies in some bad practices that young people often fall prey to, for example idle gossiping, liquor drinking, eve teasing etc.
- Providing opportunities to the students to realize their own potentialities as sportsmen and cultural performers, the self-owned qualities which they themselves remain unaware of.

### The Context:

In the locality, which is surrounded by coal-fields, students tend to spend their non-book- learning moments in petty and trifling activities like playing mobile games or playing cards or gossiping. These activities lead to the loss of vitality of the youth populace and rob them of their life-force, which in turn jeopardize their creativity and the inquisitive spirit which are the two essential indexes of human quality development. Ultimately these undesirable activities cause the cutting of their ties with the larger society and the growth in them of some evil tendencies like isolation and separatism. This is detrimental to society, since the youth populace is the foundation of society. Engaging the students in healthy activities like sports and games in a regular manner is a replenishment of their vital energy and engaging them in cultural activities is the fostering of a sense of belongingness to the larger society. Further, some students, although not academically sound, are gifted with exceptional qualities either as sportsmen or as cultural performers. Promoting sports and games and cultural activities in the college provides them the opportunity to establish themselves in their own field of speciality.



# **The Practice**

- The college organizes Annual Sports during winter every year. It is held on two to three consecutive days.
- Students participate at large in various events like races, long jump, high jump, javelin throw, discus throw. Professional judges monitor the events.
- To boost up students, teachers take part in games like teachers' race. Each year, a tug-of- war is conducted as the last event in which the competitors are the students' group on the one side and the staff group on the other. This creates a great enthusiasm among students and staff.
- The non-teaching staff also have their respective events in which they take part with great fervor.
- Students ranking in different events are presented with medals and cups in a magnificent function held at the Binay Choudhury Mancha, the open air stage, at the end of the sports programme. The Principal along with the teaching and non-teaching staff participate in the prize giving ceremony.
- These ranking students are then encouraged to take part in intercollege sports championship conducted by the affiliated University every year. With much enthusiasm they take part in the Inter-Non-Govt. College Athletic Meet in both district and state level every year.Students also participate in Inter-Collegiate Tournament organized by the DPI.
- Interdepartmental football and cricket tournaments are organized in the college playground.
- The teacher in charge of sports and games selects players from these tournaments for the formation of college team which participates in intercollege football and cricket tournaments organized by the affiliated University.
- There is a badminton court in the college premises. Intra –college badminton tournament is organized every year.
- Indoor game competitions like carom, table tennis and chess competitions are held every year.
- Inter-school sports is held every year in the college play ground. College provides the play ground free of cost.
- Annual Cultural Programme is held every year in November or December. It goes on for three consecutive days.
- Different cultural competitions like singing, recitation, drama, dance and conchshell blowing competitions etc. are organized prior to the annual programme. Students whole-heartedly take part in these events. Teachers act as judges in these different events according to their capabilities.
- On the first day of the programme, freshers are warmly felicitated by their seniors. The winners of the competitions perform on the stage. Some musical troupes are invited to perform and we all attune ourselves with the joy of their sonorous tunes. Sometimes, eminent drama groups from Calcutta along with some notable personalities like Usha Ganguly have staged performances.
- An exhibition is also organized during these days of celebration. Different stalls are set up by the different departments. Often representations by some



departments exhibit some very fundamental and original ideas. The exhibition provides the students an opportunity to expose their own capacities as original thinkers. A band of judges comprising experienced teachers of the college act as judges to select the department whose presentation is best.

- The three day cultural programme ends with the prize distribution ceremony. Those occupying place in the cultural competitions and the exhibition are honored with medals and cups.
- Often teachers and non-teaching staff perform in the annual programme. The plays presented by them have been highly appreciated by all. The tune of harmony among different stake holders of the college is again felt.

# **Evidence of success**

- Annual Sports of the college has become symbolic of the unity of spirit of the students, teachers and the non-teaching staff. It cultivates a sense of togetherness as members of one family.
- Students performing successfully in the Annual Sports of the college have also secured positions in various district level meets. Recently Debabrata Sutradhar, an alumnus of our college, occupied first position and second position in 100 meters run and long jump respectively in the Burdwan District Inter-College Games and Sports Championship 2014 held at Durgapur Government College.
- The tune of harmony among different stake holders of the college is again felt during the annual cultural programme through the participation of the students and staff in the various items of the programme.
- Students performing well in different cultural events in the college have also bagged medals in the different competitions. For example Payel Dutta, an alumnus of the department of Bengali, won gold medals in the recitation examinations conducted by Surobharati Sangeet Kalakendra in 2011& 2013. She also won a bronze medal in a recitation competition conducted by Bangiyo Sangeet Parisad.
- Some of our students like Sohini Banerjee, an alumnus of the department of English, have been performing as professional singers.

### Problems encountered and resources required

- The main problem is the paucity of funds which is hampering the realization of various plans, like the setting up of a gymnasium and a modern dressing room. Instruments of various games were purchased long ago and they need to be replaced urgently.
- Funds are also required for the maintenance and modernization of the Binay Chowdhury Mancha.
- The play ground needs to be leveled in order to maintain the safety and standard of various games played there.



- The number of musical instruments like harmonium, tablas etc. needs to be increased to ensure the participation of a larger number of students in various cultural activities. In this regard, setting up of a music room in the college would be beneficial.
- More efforts are required to detract the students from being engaged in idle noncreative activities and to lead them to healthy and creative work.
- Though every year some students emerge as good-sportsmen and cultural performers, the talents of many students remain untapped. Therefore more efforts are needed to identify and ensure 100% participation of talented students.
- Talented students should be given the opportunity of receiving specialized training both in respect of sports and culture from professionals. Some such programs need to be arranged by the college.
